Whether it be the extension of the Monongahela valley road from M'Keesport via. Brownsville and Waynesburg to Cameron, or the completion of the Chartiers Va!ley road to. Washington, with the possibility of it reaching us in time, either would be preferable to the present state of things. We have been laggard long enough and for many reasons known to all, it behooves our leading business men and representatives to move at once in the matter.
