

SATURDAY, March 9, 1867 During the past week the general markets have ruled dull compared with the previous week. There has been but few changes in prices, and the demand for goods very light. A general dullness prevails, caused partially by the unfavorable weather and bad condition of the country roads ; but more particularly on the account of the failure of Congress to pas the Tariff bill. This failure has had a disheartening effect, visi le in nearly all branches of business. Trade here generally depends

upon the manufacturers, and as most of these are doing but little ; the iron mills closed, and likely to continue so most, if not all the coming spring and summer, merchants have not the same confidence in an active spring trade that they had before the failure of the Tariff bill. Although spring has opened, yet the complaint reaches us from all places, equally alike, of the same stagnation and unsatisfactory condition of trade, that we are here experiencing.
