HOUSEHOLD HINTS.—Wood ashes and common salt wet with water will stop the cracks of a stove, and prevent the smoke from escaping. Stir Poland starch with a common candle, and it will not stick to the iron, and it will be much nicer. Alum and vinegar is good to set colors of red, green or yellow. Sal soda will bleach very white: one spoonful is enough for a kettle of clothes. Save your seeds for garden plants, or for garden jars, when sandy. Wash your tea trays with cold soda, polish with a little flour and rub with a dry cloth. Frozen potatoes make more starch than fresh ones; they also make nice cakes. A hot shovel held over varnished furniture will take out the white spots. A bit of glue dissolved in skin milk and water will restore old erape. Ribbons of any kind should be washed in cold soap suds and not rinsed. If your flat irons are rough rub them with fine salt, and it will make them smooth. Out straw is the best for filling beds; it should be changed once a year. If you are buying a carpet for durability, choose small figures. A bit of soap rubbed on the hinges of doors will prevent their creaking. Scotch snuff put in holes where crickets come out will destroy them. A gallon of strong lye put in a barrel of hard water will make it soft as rain water. Half a cranberry on a corn will soon kill it. Always mend clothing before washing.

OUR-DOOR WHITEWASH.—The following is well recommended:—Two quarts skimmed milk; 2 ozs. fresh slaked lime; 5 lbs. whitening; put the lime into a stone-ware vessel, pour upon it a sufficient quantity of milk to make a mixture resembling cream, and then add the balance of the milk. Crumble the whitening and spread it on the surface of the fluid. Stir or grind as you would lead paint, and apply as you do other paints. It dries quick, and a second or third coat can be added if desired. It is inodorous, does not rub off. This quantity will cover 57 square yards with one coat. It may be colored, if desired, by adding coloring matter.

ORCHARD.—Look well to peach trees, shorten to and see that the peach worm is not at work. Pour boiling water on the lower part of the trunk near the ground and if a sufficient quantity be used, it will choke the worm without injury to the trees; we are well convinced that even three gallons of boiling water to each tree, may be used without injury. Manure trees, and remember that they require cultivation. Attend to preparation of cions early, and graft such trees as require it. Those who have chickens should give them a little fresh meat occasionally, and fresh ground to scratch over, and a little lime and sand to pick into. Little

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chicks should be kept in a comfortably warm place of nights, and should have old bread soaked in water for their principal food during the day. Keep them where they can always have access to water in shallow vessels, and keep them out of the rain. A TRUTH STRANGER THAN FACTS.—An Indianapolis letter writer says: While passing through the Union Depot a few days ago I was accosted by a one-armed man in faded army blue. His apparent familiarity surprised me at first, but I soon recognized him as an old acquaintance.
