Pursuant to a call, the Committee of the Ten Mile Association, convened at the Baptist Church in Jefferson, Greene Co. Pa. on the 26th June A. D. 1867.

A. A. Parsons, Chairman of said Committee called the Council to order. Rev. C. Tilton was elected Secretary and said Committee, for the ensuing associational year.

On motion, the subscribers to the College were invited to participate in the deliberations of said meeting.

Resolved, That the first Session of the said College shall be opened in the Baptist Church at Jefferson, on the 21st Monday in April next.

Resolved, That the number of Trustees of said College, shall be twenty-one, seven of whom shall constitute a quorum and shall be elected hereafter as provided in the said Charter.

Whereupon, the said committee elected twenty-one Trustees, to serve to the close of the first session of said College, unless the said institution shall be sooner incorporated.

The board of Trustees then organized by electing Rev. A. J. Collins, President and Dr. S. S. Smith, Secretary.

On motion, a building committee of five persons, were elected.

On motion, the College committee shall meet at Jefferson on the 4th of July next, to agree on the style of the house.

On motion, the College committee, and the building committee shall meet at Jefferson on the 16th July next, to seal out the contract for the construction of the College building.

Further notice of the letting of said contract will be given.

SUICIDE IN FAYETTE COUNTY.—Mention was made in our last issue of the fact that a man had been found suspended by a rope to a tree, on the bank of the Monongahela river in Fayette county. The following particulars have since been ascertained: The deceased was about thirty years of age, five feet six or seven inches in height, hazel eyes, black hair and sandy goatee. He wore a flannel shirt, cassimere pants and coat. The cord by which he was hanging was made from strong flax sewing thread. Justice Edgington, of Masontown, held an inquest on the body, and the jury rendered a verdict of death by suicide. It is supposed, to have been the body of William Davis, a shoemaker, who left Uniontown, Fayette county, about the twentieth inst. and has not since been heard from. Davis was a very temperate man, and had an attack of mania potu when last seen in Uniontown, and the description of the body found answers that of Davis precisely.
