he following was received from the President British Mediation.

To the Senate and House of Representatives. The Government of Great Britain has offered its mediation for the adjustment of the dispute between the United States and France, carefully guarding that point in the controversy which, as it involves our honor and independance, admits of no compromise. I have cheerfully accepted the offer. It will be obviously improper to resort even to the mildest measures of a compulsory character, until it is ascertained whether France has de-clined or accepted the Mediation. I therefore recummend a suspension of all proceeding on that at once accepted. I have reason to believe that ne part of my special message of the 15th of Janua. such offer has been made, but the French wish it ry last, which proposes a partial non-intercourse with France. While we cannot but highly appreciate the clevated and disinterested motives of the offer of Great Britain, and feel a just reliance on the great influence of that power to restore the relations of ancient friendship between the United States and France, and know too that our pacific policy will be strictly adhered to, until the national honor compels us to depart from it we should be insensible to the exposed condition of our country, or forget the lessons of experience, if we did not efficiently and sedulously pre-

pare for an adverse result.

The peace of a nation does not depend exclusirely upon its own will; but upon the beneficial policy of neighboring powers; and that nation which shall be found totally unprepared for the exigencies and dangers of war, although it come without giving warning of its approach, as criminally negligent of its honour and its duty. I can not too strongly repeat the recommendation already made, to place the sea-board in a propor state of defence, and promptly to provide the mea sures for amply protecting our commerce.
