THE GREAT RAILBOAD BILL.

TN ANOTHER column we publish the -I message of Governor Geary vetoing-the bill entitled An act to facilitate and secure the construction of additional railway.connections, der In his message he demonstrates the unconstitutionality of the proposed law, and the inexpediency of the scheme. The message is an able, well written document, and will attract general attention for the cogency and strength of reasons

adduced. The Governor quotes the 4th, 5th and 6th sections of 11th article of the Constitution, which provide for the creation of a sinking fund to aid in the extinguishment of the State debt, and which prohibits its use, unless in case of war, invasion or insurrection. except for that purpose; that the credit of the State shall not be loaned to any individual, company, corporation or association; and that the State shall not assume the debt of any county, city, borough or township, or

of any corporation or as ociation, 7 The other strong point is the uncertainty of who is to exceute the bill. Responsible parties are not named and even if they were, they are not bound to anything except the construction and equipment of the contemplated road, and as to the manner that might be done by irresponsible parties, it might be but a repetition of the experience in the ease of the Philadelphia and Erie Railroad, to which the Governor alludes in his mes-

It would seem as if during the recess of Painters Saddlers. the Legislature, scheming speculators map out plans of raids on the treasury in the shape of all imaginable kinds of bills, not leaving out of view efforts to influence the Governor in favor of their projects, When we'were in Harrisburg lately we made inquiry in reference to the Railroad bill just vetoed by Governor Geary. The impression there was, that if the bonds were taken from the State Treasury as proposed, it would nevfer receive one cent back a cent in the shape of guaranteed interest on them.


