PRINCE ARTHUR sailed from Canada on
Thursday for England.

We have received the article cut from the
HORN AGE, on the First Manufacture of Al-
uminic Pig Iron, in this city, and will at-
tend to the matter next week.

In the Senate on Thursday the report of
the committee of conference on the army
bill to reduce the number of army officers
and for other purposes, was laid on the
table, yes 29 nays 16.

A SON of Col. Forney, of the Press, was
injured on Thursday at New Orleans, so
severely, while attempting to jump on a rail-
road train, that amputation of his left leg, it
was thought, would be necessary.

There is a speech of war of the European
powers, of the proposed elevation of
Prince Hohenlohe. Considerable feel-
ing has sprung out of it between France and
Prussia, the former opposing the candida-
ture of Hohenlohe, the latter of course
supporting it. An alliance is reported be-
tween Spain and Prussia, and France and
Austria.

An interesting yacht race is now in pro-
gress across the Atlantic. On Monday after-
noon, 1st, the "Dartmouth," commanded by
our own Mr. Beirne, and the "Cambria,"
by its owner, Mr. Ashbury, left the Irish
coast, the goal being the light ship off Sandy
Hook. "Americans are wagering on the
"Dartmouth" coming into port first, and find
a good many takers among the English, who
bet confidence in the sea-going qualities
of the "Cambria."

NEXT FALL thirty States will vote for
members of Congress, returning in all two
hundred and twelve. If the States are wise
they will return those members who
have done well, and voted for Protection, and
those who have joined them as Repre-
sentatives who are fit men of the same prin-
ciple; for without it this country cannot
prosper in wealth, population and power by the
rate to which her great extent and unlim-
ited resources entitle her.

WE, the Cuban intelligencia, seems in-
