



NUTRITIVE VALUE OF BRAN. We have the following article from the editor of GERHARD'S FARMER-ZEITUNG, and

Modern chemistry has contributed many useful hints in the way of a more rational preparation of fodder, and if stock-breeder and raiser will only take advantage of them. and raiser will only take advantage of them, he may do a great deal toward decreasing expenses. It has long been known that the husk of the grain, or the bran proper, constains more nutritive ingredients than the flour; yet it was not understood how it could be made available as al food for cattle. It must be known that in the state in which in

The breeder and stock-raiser thus possesses in the bran a fodder that surpasses rape and linesed oil cakes in nutritive value. How highly these are estimated is well known. By mixing bran with straw and hay, which are deficient in phosphates, a most nutritive fodder for young and milking cattle may, for instance, be prepared. The first need phosphate for their bones, the second for their milk. But the nutritive value of bran may be still more enhanced, if one will only take pains to prepare it in the following manner: 100 pounds of bran must be mixed well with milk.

DESTRUCTION OF FOREST TIMBER.—It must be cause for regret to every lover of Nature, and to all who feel an interest in the
