



DESOLATE FARMS. There is an evident decay of agriculture in some of the less favored districts, which I have recently visited with nelancholy interest. The evidences of former thrift and wealth, are seen in the large and well finished houses, and other buildings, the good walls, bridges, highways, &c., and in the commodious churches and school houses, occupied by a former generation. Large families by a former generation. Large families have been raised and educated and endowed on these farms, which are now so pools as to give but a meagre support to a tenant.

Around these hearths were gathered group of intelligent youth, and here was an open door of generous hospitality. These youth were fed and clothed and clubated—many of the street the series of the series.

were fed and clothed and educated many of them liberally—from the avails of these farms, and they have gone forth into all pasts of our land, the sons as merchants, ministers and legislators, and the daughters into the highest circles of social life.

They came back occasionally to the dear old fire-place, and go out into the fields where they drove the cows, where they hoed corn, and where the barefoot boys and girls gathered flowers, and into the old school-nouse, whose benches were crowded in their day with aspiring pupils. All is changed now. There is no corn, the pastures look brown, the meadow is grown over with liard hack, the buildings are falling down. Here is the old mansion of Col. G., whose many sons and daughters have gone to honorable places far away. The many window's that once blazed with a cheerfull light, now stuffed with hay, show that that old house once blazed with a cheerful light, now stuffed with hay, show that that old house has become a barn. The old farm has become a part of another.

There is another whose tasteful porch and carved stair way, show it to have been once the abode of elegance. It is where Judge B. and his many brothers and sisters were born. Now there are children plenty here, as their tast here have one above number in the

Now there are children plenty here, as their tow heads show, one above another in the window, but they are the children of a French collier, whose "bush" is on the lack part of the farm, and who has taken tenporary possession of the old house. The out buildings and orchard and fences show the same desolation, and this scene represents a hundred other districts, in the older and reacher parts of the country. There's sents a hundred other districts, in the older and rougher parts of the country. Though in its aspects rather end, it is not to the reproach of the agriculture of our day. The causes are reasonable, and speak rather of the enterprise of those who have gone out from their old homes. Those of them who continue in their father's calling, by a concontinue in their father's calling, have gone to the richer fields of our common inficri-tance, where their labor is better rewarded. It would be unreasonable to condemn them for a mere sentiment—though a generous one -to the severe toll, and narrow income which would be their portion here. which would be their porton here.

We see sometimes an attempt to rescue from its degradation the old homestead, by some son who has made a fortune in the city, and whose fillal piety and fond recollection of youthful days made him promise to spend his last years in his old home. He renovates the old house, and modernises the barn, with gables and cupola. He drait-and builds walls and straightens the highway, and paints the farm gates. It is well he comes from Wall street. He can afford it, and it gives him enjoyment, and though he finds it uphill business, in more senses than one, he does not ask if it pays. It may seem incredible that there farms.

now so poor, ishould once have sustained such poor, ishould once have sustained such population; but they only drew half their support out of the land; the other half came from their domestic and other manusfactures. Their cash purchases were not one tenth part as much as such families would now require. Under the present system of exchange, the farmer's family is supported entirely from the land; therefore he must have more and better land. These farms might be restered and mide very productive, but it would cost more than to buy land already rich and easily cultis to boy land already rich and easly culti-vated. Our country is so great and there are so many inviting fields in other parts, that it must be many years before these waste places will be restored.—Cor. Country Gras
