**WORK TRANSFERRED
AT L. V. R. R. SHOPS**

Supervision of Several Departments of Old Shops Transferred From Master Mechanic Kells to Shop Superintendent James.

An important order regarding the Lehigh Valley railroad shops at this place went into effect today by which a number of departments heretofore under the supervision of Master Mechanic Kells were placed under charge of Shop Superintendent James.

The order transfers all work in the passenger car department, including the paint shop and the freight car department. The passenger and freight car inspectors remain under Mr. Kells' direction. Mr. Kells will have charge of all division work on the Pennsylvania and the Auburn divisions, with all outlying points, and will retain his supervision over the engineers and firemen.

CHOICE OF HIS PARTY

The re-nomination of Mr. McNulty as commissioner was made by a majority sufficiently large to indicate that he was clearly the choice of his party and that the time-honored practice of giving a candidate but the single term had been abolished. Hereafter it is probable that the one term shibboleth will cut very little ice with the Democratic voters of Bradford county.
