Dr. Williams' Resignation from the Town Council Accepted at a Special Meeting of the Municipal Fathers Last Evening and Oath of Office Administered.

A special meeting of the Council was held last evening. In the absence of President Sawtelle Mr. Lacey was appointed chairman. The secretary read the resignation of Dr. E. E. Williams as councilman from the First ward and on motion of Mr. Samuels it was accepted, taking effect at once. Boro Attorney Yocum presented a certified copy of the appointment of Dr. Williams as Burgess which was placed on file.

After the meeting Mr. Yocum, as notary public, administered the oath to Dr. Williams as Burgess. This fills the vacancy till next spring when another Burgess will be elected. No appointment was made to fill Dr. Williams' former place of councilman.

THE GOSPEL SHIP READY TO SAIL

There will be a mass meeting for men tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock at which Mr. Rees will speak on "Man's Greatest Problem." The postmen's quartette will furnish music and a cornetist will lead the singing.

At 7:30 there will be a union service of all the churches assisting in the movement, with music by a chorus choir. Mrs. Rees will have charge of the singing throughout the meetings.
