BOROUGH COUNCIL ADOPTS RESOLUTIONS

Last Honor to Deceased Burgess. Traction Company Withdraws Application for Extended Franchise--The Sewer Question Deferred.

The regular monthly meeting of the borough council was called to order at 8:35 last evening. Councilman Lacy was elected temporary chairman and filled that position until President Sawtelle appeared. Upon recommendation of Councilman Burns in accord with petition of citizens, a hydrant was ordered placed at corner of Hoover and Draper streets and one on Second street.

Councilman Pritchard reported having disposed of all the rubber coats except those for the Packers, and that they had refused to accept for them. He was instructed to hold the coats until he received such receipt.

Committee appointed to inspect condition of the alley north of Allison street and east of Wilbur avenue, reported the condition very unsanitary. The matter was referred to the Board of Health with recommendation that action be taken at once.

Two petitions for walks on south side of Lincoln from Chestnut to Keystone avenue and from Elsbree street to Keystone were referred to the street committee.

The matter of Dr. Everitt's walk on Pleasant street was referred to street committee with power to act on advice of the borough attorney.

Three walks on Thomas avenue were ordered repaired.

Councilman Hause brought up the matter of Special Officer Sisson. He said that Mr. Sisson had been appointed and duly sworn in a month ago, but that the chief had refused to give him a badge, giving as his reason that he acted upon the instruction of the police committee. The committee denied any knowledge of the situation but promised an investigation at once.

Councilman Heverly reported that the applicants for the street railway franchise had refused the committee's proposition to pay \$50 a year on each regular and special car. They offered to pay \$50 on each special car. The committee refused to entertain the offer. The applicant also refused to submit any plan to the council not recommended by the committee, and withdrew the application.

The sewer matter was then brought up, but was put over until this evening at 8 o'clock in order to give the committee an opportunity to examine into the matter more closely.

Expenses of the police department amounting to \$202.61, and of the street department to the amount of \$116.75 were ordered paid.

The police report showed \$25 fines paid during the month.

The council then went into executive session for a short time.

The council adopted the following resolutions relative to the death of late Burgess Frank Pike.

Whereas, It has pleased Almighty God to remove from our midst our late Burgess, Frank Pike; and

Whereas, The high esteem in which he was held by this Council, as well as the citizens of this borough, renders it proper that we place on record our appreciation of his services to this borough as Burgess and citizen; Therefore be it

Resolved, That in the death of our late Burgess, Frank Pike, we lose a most respected citizen, who was ever interested in the welfare of our borough and always discharged the duties of his office in a most honorable and satisfactory manner; And be it further

Resolved, That this borough council tenders its heartfelt sympathy to the family and relatives of our beloved fellow citizen; that these resolutions be entered on our minutes, and that a copy be sent to the wife of the deceased, and that same be published in the daily papers.

SAYRE SCHOOLS AGAIN OPEN

Enrollment Not Complete Because of Labor Day--West Sayre Building Not Yet Ready

The bells rang merrily and many children trooped off to school yesterday morning. The total enrollment for the borough was 1066, 38 less than last year. Many pupils did not attend because it was Labor day, and the enrollment will be increased by them and by late comers from vacations out of town. The Sayre enrollment is the largest in the county. There are thirty-one teachers in the borough schools this year. Not much work was done yesterday and today. Text books were given out and lessons assigned, and lessons will begin tomorrow.

The West Sayre building is not yet ready for business because of the failure of the desks, due Aug. 20, to arrive. Classes have been organized, however.

The grades at the high school building have been changed to different rooms, and cards of directions are visible throughout the halls. There were 113 pupils enrolled in the high school department yesterday. The senior class this year will be about as large as that of last year.

BUSINESS MEN SHUT DOWN ON DONATIONS

The following rules in regard to donations, subscriptions, etc., have been adopted by the Business Men's Association of Sayre:

"First, That we refuse all subscriptions, etc., to out of town parties, or to patronize any calendar schemes (church or society) or any time or memorandum book that is gotten up to help out of town parties who may be soliciting for same.

Second, That we buy no tickets for raffles, entertainments or excursions.

"Third, That we subscribe not over one dollar in cash to those company fairs, and that we refuse to do any advertising on programs, or give any money on books for contestants that may be running for same in connection with said fairs, or any other organization that may be conducting a contest."

REES DRAWS A LARGE CROWD

A Thousand Attend Evening Service at Tabernacle--Inspiring Appeal to Men in the Afternoon.

A thousand people at a religious meeting is a sight which it is safe to say Sayre has never witnessed before, yet this is the record of the first union meeting in the Gospel Tabernacle on Packer avenue Sunday night. The committees which have had the arrangements in charge have every reason to be pleased with the hearty response which has met their efforts and every pastor wore a beaming face as he looked over the big audience. About 400 men attended the meeting at 3 o'clock on Sunday and after a brief dedicatory service in which Rev. H. M. Crydenwise, D. D., offered the prayer of dedication, Rev. Mr. Rees spoke from the text "What shall I do then with Jesus which is called Christ?" It was a candid and forcible presentation of a manly religion to men and held the attention of everyone from its beginning to its close. He has a pleasing delivery, never lacks for words or ideas and gives one the impression of being thoroughly in earnest.

The Sunday evening service was an inspiring one. It is worth while to go to the Tabernacle to hear the singing. Mrs. Rees has proven a capable and inspiring director, and under her leadership the audience sang hymns old and new with spirit.

At the meeting last night the members of the churches were organized into groups each under a leader for personal work.

There is to be a meeting at 3 o'clock today and Wednesday in the Presbyterian church. On Thursday afternoon at the Tabernacle Mr. Rees will speak to women, and there will be a children's meeting at the same place Friday at 4 o'clock.

AIR HOSE BROKE TANK CARS BUCKLED

Engine 1218 in charge of Engineer Lou Bostwick was pulling a westbound pickup freight slowly past the Lehigh Valley station Sunday afternoon when the air hose between two empty oil tank cars broke. The brakes set immediately, the train buckled, the tanks leaped upward and were thrown across the adjoining tracks. When the rear most one struck the ground the tank broke loose from the platform and fell in front of a Michigan Central box car which was derailed. Engine 2237, coming down a track alongside the freight, stopped barely in time to avoid being caught in the mixup.
