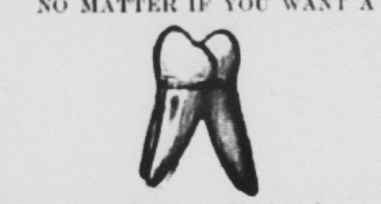

The crowd at the tabernacle last night learned a new song. In fact these seem to be two or three new ones to be learned every evening, and the audience tackles them bravely though they are not always mastered in one lesson. But after Mrs. Rees had sung "Jesus, O How Sweet the Name," the congregation took up the refrain and sang it again and again until it is safe to say nearly everybody knew it. They were humming it as they went out anyhow. The music is a feature of the tabernacle meetings.

Two out of town clergymen conducted the opening service last evening and Mr. Rees preached from the words, "It is high time to awake out of sleep," and applied the words to pretty much everybody present, though no one was detected in the act of slumber. There is a "go" about the tabernacle meetings which would make such a thing impossible. The evangelist described the lethargy which is dangerous and made a telling appeal for the life which is thoroughly awake on its moral side. His sermons abound in illustrations which really illustrate, no one of which is used for its own sake.
