**COUNCIL ACCEPTS SEWER PLANS**

**Concise Report by Surveyors Meets Favor of Councilmen—Committee to Prepare to Refer to People—Many Sidewalk Rebates Allowed—West Elected to Council.**

The Borough Council held an adjourned regular meeting in the municipal edifice last evening. Chairman Eason of the police committee reported that the mixup in regard to a badge for special officer Sisson had arisen from a misunderstanding of one of the committee, and had been amicably settled. The following bills were ordered paid: Valley Telephone Co., fire alarm service, \$100; C. F. Mallory, crosswalks, \$71.80.

The sewer committee, through Chairman Heverly, reported that they found plans and maps submitted by the Whiteman-Williams Co. satisfactory. Mr. Proctor was present and read his report, which was a lucid explanation of the plans they had considered and rejected and also of the plan which they recommended to the borough. The report was remarkably comprehensive and readily intelligible, and showed thorough knowledge of the question on the part of its maker.

The proposed system will carry 4,000,000 gallons of sewage a day, and takes in all the streets of the borough. The outlet is to be located 800 feet below the intake of the Water Co. Consideration was given to the probability of a new state law requiring the purification of all sewage. The main pipe would be located on Lehigh avenue, at a maximum depth of 15 feet. It would be necessary to raise North Wilbur avenue at the pond hole, Stevenson street at N. Wilbur, and Brock street to grade, in order to avoid sinking the main pipe to a depth of 18 or 20 feet. The pipe in the business district would be from 8 to 12 feet below the surface. The velocity in the pipes would be not less than 24 inches a second. The drainage sewers, necessary only in the business district and a few other places, would be an entirely different system. The report recommended a special official to have charge of the sewers, and said that a plumbing code should be recommended, as the success of any sewer system depends largely on satisfactory house plumbing.

On motion of councilman Heverly, the council accepted the plans submitted by the surveyors. On motion of councilman Eason, the sewer committee was authorized to ascertain the streets in which it is most advisable to put sewers, if the whole project is inadvisable, ascertain the cost and report at the next meeting.

President Sawtelle said that special legal advice might be needed by the committee and recommended that the committee be given power to secure additional legal talent if necessary.

Councilman Eason said that such things could not be provided for in advance, but that it was necessary to have a municipal building and a sanitary lockup and a suitable headquarters for the fire department. President Sawtelle said that he was in favor of these things but that he understood that but one proposition could be submitted to the people at one time.

Councilman Samuels made a very lucid and forcible statement of his position on the sewer question. He said that if the people turned down the recommendation of the board in the matter, the board would vote a franchise for a private sewer system to the first corporation that came along. Last year, two large corporations approached the council and wanted to apply for charters to build private sewer systems, and charge rental to property owners for usage, but were discouraged. Such a corporation would net about 20 per cent. on their investment every year. If the borough put in the sewers, this profit would pay for them in a few

years and the town would have a good system at minimum cost. If the people would turn such a proposition down, he would give the franchise to a corporation and would try hard to buy some of its stock, too.

On motion of councilman Adamy, the committee was empowered to employ such legal talent as might be found necessary, and the special sewer committee was made a standing committee of the council.

On motion of councilman Lacey, C. C. West was nominated to fill the vacancy on the council caused by the resignation of Dr. E. E. Williams. The roll call showed a unanimous vote in favor of Mr. West, and he was declared elected.

Councilman Samuels announced that some notes would soon be due. All but \$4,000 could be met by incoming taxes by Sept. 16. It was decided that \$5,000 be borrowed for a year, at interest not to exceed 5 per cent. On motion of councilman Heverly the bill of Williams, Whitman & Co. for plans specifications for the sewers, amounting to \$950.00, was ordered paid.

**CANDIDATE FOR PROTHONOTARY**

W. G. Gordon, candidate for the Republican nomination to the office of prothonotary made vacant by the death of Frank Pike, was calling on voters in Sayre within the last day or so. Mr. Gordon is one of the most widely known Republicans in this county, and his thorough acquaintance will no doubt stand him in good stead during the brief campaign which lies before him. It has been Mr. Gordon's lot to give way for others when political offices were at the disposal of the Republican party, but now his friends say that he has withdrawn enough and they will put up a strong fight for his nomination. Mr. Gordon has been a great favorite with voters in the rural portions of the county for years, and his vote there will be large.

**LATE FIRE SOON OUT**

Soon after three o'clock this afternoon fire was discovered in the house of F. J. Zimmerman on Bradford street. The blaze was caused by the cook stove and was extinguished by quick work on the part of Dan Clary and others. The alarm was sent in for safety and the fire department responded. The people of Bradford street had a narrow escape this time as the high wind would have swept the blaze down the row if it had gained a bit of headway.

**SCHOOL DIRECTORS SETTLE DISPUTE**

**West Sayre Building Controversy Ended by Maney's Acceptance of Directors' Terms—Cigarettes Put Under the Ban.**

The regular monthly meeting of the board of education was held last evening, all members being present. After the reading of the minutes the board went into executive session and the matter of the settlement of the new school building controversy was taken up. Messrs. Evans and Maynard, attorneys for the school board, and Mr. Vocum, representing Thos. Maney, were present. As announced by The Record last week the result was an unqualified acceptance of the terms offered by the school board. Mr. Maney wanted an allowance for excavation and interest, but this the school board refused. The amount of \$1,173.28 will be deducted from the contract price, and the balance paid.

After open session was resumed the several bills for repairs, school supplies and janitor's salary were ordered paid. Changes on the new building were reported complete, bill amounting to \$790.

Miss Lena McCarty's salary was raised from \$50 to \$55 a month and Miss Myrtle Potter's from \$50 to \$52.50.

The board took into consideration the admission of a student into the high school under the provision of the act approved March 16, 1905, providing that a child qualified to enter a high school residing in a district having no high school, may attend in an adjoining district that has a high school, provided the consent of the school board in the latter district is obtained. The cost of school books and tuition is collected from the district from which the student came. The request was granted after considerable discussion.

The quality of coal furnished by Coleman Hassler for new building was discussed. Mr. Hassler admitted the coal was rusty but said it was first class and that he would indemnify the board against any loss that might arise from its use. The board thought it would prove satisfactory and directed that delivery be continued.

The matter of changes in number of students attending the various buildings was referred to the superintendent with power to act.

The law approved March 16, 1905, imposing a penalty of from \$100 to \$500 and making it a misdemeanor for any person to furnish by purchase, gift or otherwise, cigarettes or cigarette paper to a minor was brought to the attention of the board. They were heartily in favor of its strict enforcement. This habit by the Sayre youth is prevalent to a deplorable extent and the practice is highly injurious, stunting the physical and mental growth of the child, and in numerous instances rendering him incapable of doing even creditable school work. It was thought a public sentiment should be aroused against the violation of this law, and that all citizens should interest themselves in its enforcement.

The board adjourned to meet Monday, September 11.
