Explanation Asked

Waverly—In an interview this morning with a prominent Waverly resident the matter of the refusal on the part of the Village Board of Trustees to allow the W. S. & A. Traction Company to cross the bridge over the Erie tracks on Elmira street, thus connecting the main line with the proposed south side line was discussed. A large number of south side residents, heretofore in accord with every action of the Waverly Village Board have been heard to voice many unkind sentiments over its recent action toward them. There is a population of 1500 or 2000 people in South Waverly, and a trolley service is what the residents of that borough have long wanted, and when everything was in readiness to begin work on the line the movement was cut short by an action of the Waverly city fathers. Why is it thus? There is also considerable feeling against the action taken on the part of Waverly merchants and business men who would derive a large benefit from a trolley service in South Waverly. It is to be hoped that steps will be taken to get the road into South Waverly, even though over private right of way, as in our opinion it would be beneficial to this village and to residents on the south side as well.

New Cement Floor
