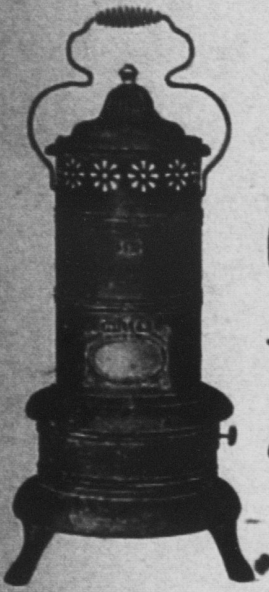

GROWING INTEREST
IN UNION MEETINGS

Impressive Sermon by Mr. Rees Last Night Affects a Large Crowd—No Service This Evening, But Big Men's Meeting Tomorrow.

It is significant of the growing interest in the Tabernacle meetings that in spite of all other attractions last night including the band concert near by, over 800 people gathered in the big building to listen to Mr. Rees' sermon and sing the gospel songs. Rev. W. H. Sawtelle of Athens led the opening service, and the evangelist preached on "The Love of God," John 3-16. The familiar words, "God so loved the world" took on new meaning to many, and it was a quiet, serious crowd that filed out at the close of the meeting.

There will be no meeting tonight, but two services tomorrow. At 3 o'clock the great mass meeting for men, with the "Twentieth Century Sodom" for the subject, and another service at 7:30 which will take the place of the evening service of all the churches which are uniting. Next Wednesday there will be an all day service in the Methodist church at which several clergymen of well known ability from out of town will speak.

MONSTER CIRCUS COMING

Carl Hagenbeck's Triple Ring Tented Attraction to Exhibit in Sayre Sept. 27.

Fresh from a successful season at the St. Louis World's Fair and combined with thrilling arctic acts direct from the famous hippodromes of Paris, London and Vienna, the Carl Hagenbeck circus, trained wild animals and monster menagerie, will exhibit in Sayre, Wednesday, September 27.

Agents representing the circus have arranged for excursion rates on all steam and electrical roads in this district. Hundreds of people in this neighborhood will take advantage of these rates.

The Carl Hagenbeck circus, although it is the road for the first time as a tented amusement enterprise, is the largest in the United States. It is transported from city to city on three trains of forty cars, all especially constructed. Over 500 horses are carried to draw the big dens, cages, lairs, calliopes, band chairs and tableaux floats in the daily free street pageant, and there are 722 men and women on the payroll.

Twelve acres of ground are covered by the immense tents, of which there are nine. The main exhibition tent has a seating capacity of 10,000 and the performances are given in three rings, in a monster steel girt arena and on two platforms, and around a wide hippodrome racing track.
