**ATTORNEY HAWKES HAS RESIGNED**

**Board Votes to Reconsider Trolley Question, But Defers Action Until Next Wednesday Evening.**

Waverly.—The Village Board of Trustees met at Town Hall Saturday evening. The hall was crowded with people. The president announced that the committee had called upon the Water company, but owing to lack of instructions had been unable to make an offer. The committee was given power to employ experts to arrive at the value of the water plant and to submit the same to the Water company. The president asked Village Attorney Hawkes if he could aid them in case of litigation. Mr. Hawkes stated that anticipating this question he had prepared a communication to the Board. This stated that as a stockholder and attorney for the Water company he could not conduct litigation against the Water company, but if possible he would be pleased to act as attorney in other matters, or he would tender his resignation. Mr. Tucker asked him how it would be in regard to the Waverly, Sayre & Athens Traction company, and Mr. Hawkes stated that at a recent meeting he had given the Board advice which had been disputed by Mr. McDowell, attorney for the Chemung Valley Traction company and that Mr. Bell had been appealed to and had sided with Mr. McDowell. The attorney said his ruling was correct and cited a similar case to prove his assertions. He said that when he could not act in the dual role of attorney for the trolley company and the village he would bring the matter to their attention. On motion he was asked to resign, which he did. Village Clerk F. A. Bell was elected in his place. A vote of thanks was extended Mr. Hawkes for the able manner in which he had assisted the Board in their deliberations.

S. C. Hall, of the Hall & Lyon Furniture company, made a speech in criticism of the action of the board in denying the W. S. & A. Traction company franchises asked for in Spaulding and Elmira streets and presented a petition, signed by a number of business men, asking that they reconsider their action. Attorney Hawkes advised the board that this action would be legal without the company advertising for a public hearing. The action was opposed by Seward Baldwin and F. E. Lyford of the Chemung Valley Traction company. President Tucker took exception to some of Mr. Hall's remarks and stated that the previous action of the board had not been in favor or antagonize any corporation, but had been in the interest of the people and that they were ever ready to act for the best interests of the people and wished to keep out of the trolley fight until the decision of the State Railway Commissioners. On motion of Trustee Myers, seconded by Mr. Brougham, the board voted to reconsider by a vote of four to three—affirmatives, Myers, Brougham, Lord and Genung; negatives, President Tucker and Trustees Brown and Osborn. The board went into executive session and later voted to defer action on the franchises until a special meeting next Wednesday evening.

**An Aged Man Dead**

Waverly—George Corneby, one of the oldest and best known men in this section, died at the home of Low Walker, about one and one-half miles from this city, yesterday morning, aged 73 years. Deceased had for a long time made his home with Mr. Walker. He was a bachelor and had no immediate relatives. Funeral services will be held from the late home tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock with burial at Tioga Point cemetery. Mr. Corneby had many friends who will learn with sorrow of his demise. Undertaker E. S. Hanford has charge of the funeral arrangements.

**Mrs. Genung Dead**

Waverly—Mrs. Genung, mother of Sol. A. Genung of this city, died at her home in Halsey Valley on Friday morning, aged 92 years. Besides the two sons who reside in this city, the deceased is survived by two sons William and George of Halsey Valley.

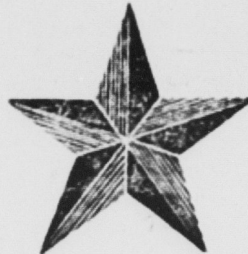
