## CRANK AT OYSTER BAY.

Permit to Carry a Revolver Found on Him When Searched. OYSTER BAY, N. Y., Sept. 13. — Isaac Schamus, a Russian Jew twenty years old, was arrested here and after an examination before Justice of the Peace Walter Franklin was sent to Mineola, N. Y., to be examined as to his sanity. The arrest was made by a secret service agent, one of the personal guards of President Roosevelt. Schamus, who resides at 231 East Fifty-second street, New York, arrived here from New York and soon afterward had an interview with Mr. Barnes, assistant secretary to the president. He desired to see the president and talk with him about the price of coal. He said he was the general coal agent of Greater New York. There was imminent danger, in his opinion, of a general strike among the miners in the anthracite coal region of Pennsylvania and that strike, he was assured, would result in great hardships for the people of the country. He wanted ten minutes with the president to tell him to appoint a commission of three men who should regulate the output of the coal supply so as to provide the poor with fuel at reasonable prices, even in the event of a strike. When Schamus was searched at Mineola a permit to carry a revolver, signed by Captain Lantry of the New York police force and Commissioner of Police McAdoo, was found on him. The permit was issued yesterday. No pistol was discovered, however, and Schamus said he had not carried one.

## May Resume Work Soon

W. S. Brown of Ambridge, arrived in Athens yesterday in the interest of the American Bridge Co. He stated that a shipment of iron had been made Monday for the Athens shops. Mr. Brown is reported as having said that work would begin in Athens within a few weeks. No official public notice of the opening of the shops has been made here as yet.

## Shen Case Goes Over

SCRANTON, Pa., Sept. 12.—On account of the inability of President Mitchell of the United Mine Workers to be present the celebrated Shen case, in which the constitutionality of the miners' certificate act is attacked, went over until the next term of court. Should the operators succeed in annulling this act it would make it possible for them to operate their mines in case of a strike with imported labor, which under the present conditions is impossible, because every miner must be armed with a certificate that he has had two years' experience in the mines and is competent to handle explosives and deal with gases.
