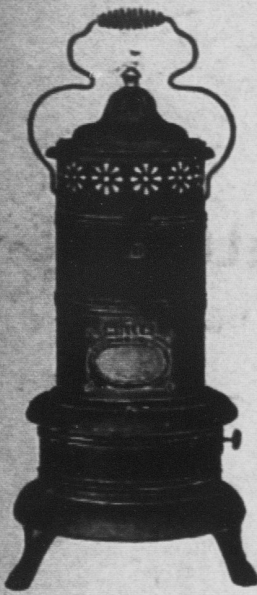

Personal Appeal of Evangelist Rees to Large Audience at Tabernacle Strikes Home—Good Attendance at All-Day Meeting.
