50TH ANNIVERSARY
TO BE CELEBRATEDBy the Waverly Fire Department.
Many Out of Town Companies To Participate—The Elaborate Preparations are Nearly Completed.

Waverly—Next Tuesday will be one of the greatest days in the history of the local fire department. For long time preparations have been under way for the celebration of their 50th anniversary, and the results of their efforts will be highly pleasing to the department. At this time will also occur the fourth annual convention of the Valley Firemen's Association. The chief event of the day will be the parade of the fire companies of the valley together with visiting companies. The line will form at 2 o'clock in the following order: Fire police will form on Broad street below Fulton; chiefs, visiting chiefs, Sayre Fire department on Fulton street, right resting on Broad street, Athens fire department on Waverly street, right resting on Broad, Waverly fire department on Park avenue, right resting on Broad; carriages containing councils from Sayre and Athens, and trustees from Waverly and ex chiefs of the Waverly fire department and representatives of the valley press on Broad street in front of Town hall. The column will start at 2:30 o'clock sharp at two taps of the fire bell.

The line of march as layed out is as follows: Down Broad to Pennsylvania avenue, up Pennsylvania avenue to Chemung, east on Chemung to Cayuta avenue, down Cayuta avenue to Ithaca street, up Ithaca and Chemung to Waverly, down Waverly to Broad, up Broad to Fulton, to Chemung, to Johnson, to Broad, to Spalding and counter-march to Fulton. Review by councils, trustees and chiefs on Broad street.

Each visiting company will be accompanied by a band of music. Arrangements have been made to entertain the visitors at dinner and supper.

The convention will be held on Monday evening in the rooms of the Tioga Hose Company. It will be composed of the officers of each department and two delegates from each company in the valley. The convention will be followed by a banquet in the Tioga House Monday evening.

The councils of Sayre and Athens, with visiting chiefs, are to be entertained by the local Board of Trustees, Fire Council, Chief J. T. Tucker and assistants. They will dine at the Norwood.

Decorations for the occasion are being made by A. K. Gore, whose reputation for first class work in his line is unsurpassed, and tonight the city presents an appearance quite befitting the occasion.

Chief Tucker, his assistants and the Fire Council have worked untiringly for the success of the convention and everything possible has been done to make the celebration one of success from every standpoint.
