**FOUR FACTORS
FOR WORKERS**

Rees Explains Works of Practical Christianity to Large Audience—Improvements Make Tabernacle More Comfortable.

Another fine audience was present at the Tabernacle meeting of last evening and an excellent sermon was given. Mr. Rees emphasized some important factors in the work of saving the lost. First, it is important that Christians come to feel that all who have not experienced a personal faith in Christ are lost. Secondly, Christians should feel that Christ is able to save all who are lost. Thirdly, Christians must come to realize that Christ intends them to go after the lost and bring them to Him. And Christ expects of the lost that they shall respond to his "follow me." A large portion of the audience tarried for the after service.

Several improvements have been made to the building which will be appreciated by those who attend the services. A screen has been placed just inside the main entrance which serves both to break the draught and lesson the noise of passers by. The openings on the west side of the building have all been closed so that the cold breeze that have on one or two occasions rendered the room uncomfortable will no longer be possible. Heaters will be added in the near future if the weather demands them. It is the purpose of the committee to make the Tabernacle comfortable.
