**Weather To-Morrow**

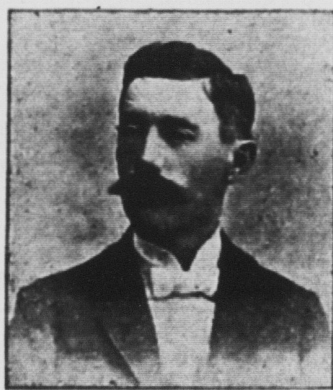
Waverly—A message from the weather bureau received at 11 a. m. today predicts showers for tonight and Tuesday.

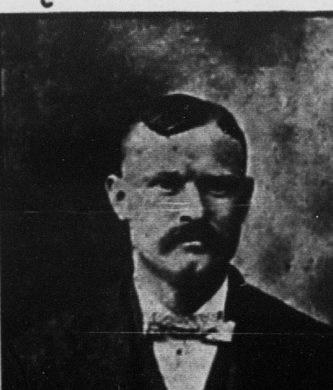
