**SLUMS TEACH
NOBLER LIFE**

Evangelist Rees at Gospel Tabernacle Draws Helpful Lessons From Sights in Slums—Mass Meeting for Men Tonight.

Rev. Rees was at his best at the services yesterday. In the afternoon he spoke to an audience of more than eight hundred men concerning the lessons that men can learn from the slums. Eloquently did the speaker discourse upon the importance of the responsibility that rests upon the men of Sayre for safeguarding the lives of the sons and the daughters that are growing into men and women here.

It was indeed a sight to see one hundred men tarry at the inquiry service and give expression to a purpose to live better christian lives, and some for the first time to dedicate themselves to the service of Christ.

At 7:30 the tabernacle was again filled with people. The way in which the people sang the gospel songs told they were there with honest motives. The text was from Jeremiah 38:10: "Take up Jeremiah the prophet from out the dungeon before he die." The speaker drew a wonderful picture of the parallel between Jeremiah in the dungeon and the man who is in the blindness and darkness of a sinful career. He must be lifted out or he will surely perish. God sent His only begotten Son to lift him out into the light of a christian life. He who refuses to accept the remedy is very much like Jeremiah would have been had he refused to grasp the rope that his rescuers let down to him when he was in the dungeon. Many tarried for the inquiry service and some gave their first public testimony for Christ. The meeting tonight will be for men only. The subject will be "The Secret of a Happy Home."

**THE BIGGEST WILD
BEAST BROTHERHOOD**

The name of the performing beast in the Carl Hagenbeck's all-acting menageries and caravan is legion, and when they reach Sayre, Wednesday, Sept. 27, they will be found to include in a single group, two Lions, three Bengal Tigers, two India Leopards, two Pumas, two huge Polar Bears, four Great Dane Dogs, and creation's crowning living wonder the only monster Hybrid Lion-Tiger, four years old, and a magnificently majestic creature, powerfully and symmetrically combining the physical peculiarities of either species, and wearing the Tiger's stripes upon the Lion's skin. Here we are confronted with the incredible spectacle of six different species, and one marvellous intermixture of two of them, each one naturally the fiercest, implacable foe of all the rest, and some of them hitherto classed as utterly untamable, under a single trainer's quiet direction, amicably and conjointly participating in the formation of a colossal composite pyramid, and various awesomely beautiful tableaux. Then we behold those specially dreaded jungle terrors, the Tigers, playfully indulging in a game of seesaw, with a Great Dane Dog gravely balancing them; a Tiger riding a tricycle which two of the Dogs propel by standing erect and pushing it from behind with their paws; Leopards and Polar Bears doing rolling and balancing stunts with barrels; the four Danes making running in and out double figure eights around the pedestals from which the Lions and Tigers grimly grin at them; the Lions and Tigers unitedly and hospitably converting themselves into a specially soft and handsome couch, for their trainer to lie dreamily upon; the curiost Tiger gratifying his teacher's curiosity by permitting him to put his head clear into its mouth; the entire group assembled at the festive board, decorously seated on chairs, the trainer in the place of honor with a monster lion on either hand. The plates before the hungry guests are heaped with raw and tempting tidbits, but none are so rude as to touch a morsel until invited by their host, when all literally fall to with a vengeance. The crowning feat of the docility and affection of these fearsome associates—and one which no other has dared to attempt—comes when their comrade and commander, causing each one of them to stand erect before him and to place its fore feet upon his shoulders, feeds it raw meat from his naked hand while held above his head as far as he can reach. Observe the ferocity displayed by the terrible great "cats" when fed in their den, and you may gain some conception of this daring feat—at once dumfounded and unparalleled.
