**DRANK LINIMENT MADE OF CHLOROFORM**

Howard Ferris, Tired of Life, Tries to Terminate Troubles With Poison—Design Frustrated by Medical Aid

Howard Ferris, 24 years old, son of Frank D. Ferris, 112 South Hopkins street, tried to commit suicide shortly before six o'clock last night by drinking a bottle of liniment which he thought to contain opium. "I have taken laudanum and will be dead before seven o'clock," he told his mother. He soon became unconscious, and was placed on the floor, while Dr. Towner was hastily summoned. He found that animation was suspended. No pulse could be perceived at the wrist or over the heart. The body was picked up and laid on a couch, and the jar of moving caused a flutter of the heart and a gasp of the lungs for breath. Powerful stimulants were injected hypodermically at short intervals, and by nine o'clock the would-be-suicide was breathing naturally and probably out of danger. This morning he was sleeping naturally.

Ferris had been having considerable trouble recently. Last week he was arrested and fined for drunkenness, and his father paid the fine. Yesterday afternoon he was seen on the street, apparently under the influence of intoxicants, but he walked home straight enough when Chief Walsh gave him the alternative of getting home or into the lockup. When he reached home he took the liniment, which quickly produced the effects of chloroform poisoning, paralyzing the heart and causing unconsciousness. It is said that Ferris has a wife, who does not live with him, but no children.

**FIRE ALARM TAKES LONG TIME TO SOUND**

At exactly 10:54 o'clock last night the engines in the yard began that tremendous tooting and howling which usually betokens a fire. Citizens who looked saw a red glow in the sky, and wondered why the regular official alarm did not sound. For full six minutes by the watch the engines hooted and bawled away before the alarm got ready to let the members of the fire department know where somebody's property was going up in smoke with no one to save it. Some communities think that six minutes is too much headway to give a fire before the companies start. Such communities have automatic electric fire alarm systems, that instantly sound the number of the box from which an alarm is sent.

**MURDER SUSPECT NOT RIGHT MAN**

Chief Walsh received a telegram from acting superintendent of police W. J. Donovan of Buffalo requesting him to watch out for one Stanislaus Sak, wanted for fatally shooting a policeman at Buffalo Sunday night. Sak is described as a Pole, 23 years old, 5 feet 7 or 8 inches tall, heavily built, dark hair and complexion, wearing dark clothes.

A man answering the description exactly, except for height, was taken from a train by Chief Walsh last night, but he had papers to prove that he was George Fish of Chicago, and was released.

**NATIONAL CAR WHEEL CO. CHANGES HANDS**

One of the largest transactions in the iron world of the present year was consummated during the past week, when the control and management of the National Car Wheel company passed into the hands of James D. Rhodes of Pittsburgh and William F. Bonnell of Cleveland.

This Company owns and operates four plants, one at Pittsburgh, one at Cleveland, one at Sayre, Pa. and one at Rochester, N. Y. Its product is cast-iron chilled car-wheels, steel-tired wheels, brass iron castings, aluminum and grey castings.

The works have an annual capacity of 300,000 wheels.

**SAYRE SCHOOLS STILL CROWDED**

At Present Rate of Increase of Pupils, a New Building Will Be Needed Soon—Directors Decided to Open Last Room.

It became evident through an announcement of Supt. Stetler at the meeting of the School Directors last night that the borough schools are still crowded in spite of the opening of the new West Sayre building, and that another school building will be necessary in the near future. Prof. Stetler announced that the two rooms for pupils of the seventh grade contained 51 pupils each, too many for good work on the part of the teacher or the pupils. Some other grades show the same crowded condition. The committees were instructed to furnish a room for seventh grade work in the new building and to look for a competent teacher for the same. By this action the last room in the West Sayre building, which was thought large enough to accommodate the pupils for several years, will be put into use. Next year the schools will be filled to overflowing again, and the directors will have to look for more room.

The directors last night talked of the possibility of temporarily reopening the old West Sayre school on the hill, but nothing was decided. Such a move would furnish temporary relief only—the only cure for the difficulty seems to be the building of new school houses to keep up with the growing juvenile population. No race suicide here—and none needed. Sayre believes and practices the strenuous life.
