Newport Citizens Form Municipal NEWPORT, R. I., Sept. 20.-About afty of the leading citizens and cottagers of Newport who have been working in the interest of good government in municipal affairs here bave perfected organization and issued a manifesto to the public. The name of the organization will be known as the Citizens' Municipal association. The following are the officers:

President, George Gordon King; vice presidents, Christopher S. Barker, John Hare Powel, Erastus E. Allen, Theodore K. Gibbs; treasurer. Thomas G. Brown: secretary, Gardner S. Perry.

In its declaration of principles the association declares that abuses bave crept into the city government and that the new organization is desirous of setting aside these barmful influences. The association desires complete separation of city management from state and national politics.
