REV. W. H. SAWTELLE RESIGNS PASTORATE

Athens—At the meeting of the Lackawanna Presbytery held in Canton this week, Rev. Wm. H. Sawtelle tendered his resignation as pastor of the Athens Presbyterian church, and the sessions voted to accept and to dissolve his relations with the church Nov. 1, 1905. The Presbytery passed resolutions highly commending him for his christian zeal, fidelity and faithfulness. They also gave authority to the church to supply the pulpit for the present until they shall deem it best to choose another pastor.

Dr. Carlos Finlay, chief of the department of health and sanitation, says that the quarantine is unjust, as there has been only three deaths from that cause among Havana's 275,000 inhabitants during an entire month.
