PALMA WILL BE PRESIDENT.

Moderates Gain Complete Victory In Cuba—Ferrara Arrested.
HAVANA, Sept. 25.—Complete returns from the entire island show that in the elections throughout Cuba for members of election boards the supporters of the government were victorious in every province, not having lost one important place.

The victory was so complete that it is now generally admitted to mean the re-election in December of President Palma and the election of the vice presidential candidate, Menes Capote, the leader of the Moderate party.

Colonel Ferrara, secretary to Governor Gomez, the Liberal candidate for the presidency, has been arrested charged with seditious and revolutionary utterances. This makes the sixth charge now pending against him, the others including participation in the burning of the city hall at Vientas, Colonel Ferrara is an Italian, but he is a veteran of the last Cuban war and one of the most prominent lawyers in Havana.

Reports have just been brought to the Liberals from their adherents in Cienfuegos of the riots which resulted in the killing of Congressman Enrique Villuendas and Chief of Police Illance. This report put the blame on the Moderates for starting the disturbances.

Additional reports from Cienfuegos received by the government say that the chief leaders in the alleged dynamite plot were two Italian anarchists named Humberto Bruni Bove and Julio Grau, who have been making seditious speeches there and elsewhere for some time.

Perfect order continues to prevail throughout the island.

BUILDING COLLAPSED.

Score of Buffalo Workmen Injured. No Loss of Life.

BUFFALO, Sept. 26.—With a crash that could be heard for blocks a three story brick building under course of construction on West Ferry street collapsed here, carrying down with it thirty bricklayers and carpenters who were at work in and on top of the structure.

A score of the men were injured, eight of them seriously. Six of the injured men were taken to hospitals, and two were removed to their homes in ambulances.

Many sustained cuts and bruises, but were able to go to their homes. The building was owned by J. J. Crowley Morris and Allen had the contract for the masonry, and their men were working on the third story when the west wall went down, carrying with it a portion of the front of the building and a section of the rear wall. That there was not serious loss of life was due to the fact that there was no roof on the building and that the mass of bricks fell out toward the street, the men being buried in the timber of the interior.

Boss Carpenter Hamm, who was working on top of the building, said that the west wall seemed to sway in toward a derrick in the center that was being used for hoisting purposes and then collapsed.

Plug Tobacco.

"I live in a town which is the greatest seat of the plug tobacco industry in the world, the town of Winston Salem, N. C.," said Hon. J. C. Burton, of the Old North state. "Last year, as the records will show, there was a production of 32,000,000 pounds of plug tobacco in the factories of Winston Salem. Doesn't look as if that much plug could be chewed up in a decade, eh? But somebody must get away with it, for the output is constantly increasing."

Tunnel Under Thames.

London's newest transportation idea is a footway tunnel under the River Thames at Woolwich, where the council's free ferry is now the sole dependence of vehicles and pedestrians, and which suspends its operations entirely during fog and bad weather, being incapacitated for a part of each of 26 days during last year.
