EVANGELIST REES SAYS FAREWELL

Preaches Powerful Sermon to
Throng in Gospel Tabernacle.
His Work Successful and Lasting.

The gospel Tabernacle was crowded to the doors last evening as evangelist Rees preached his farewell sermon. In a few well chosen words he prefaced his address by speaking his appreciation of the cordial welcome he had received from the Sayre people and of the unanimity of spirit that had existed throughout the whole series of meetings, thanking the people for their hearty co-operation in the work, and regretting only that he had been unable to be more useful in the winning of souls.

The speaker announced for his text, Amos 4:12: "Prepare to meet thy God," and the subject presented was the imperative importance of preparing to die. That the truth went home with convicting power was evidenced by the large numbers that knelt in consecration resolving to make life henceforth as never before a preparation for death. After the consecration service the company stood, and with clasped hands sang "Blest Be the Tie that Binds." The benediction followed, and a general handshaking, in which many farewell good wishes were expressed.

During the stay of Mr. and Mrs. Rees in Sayre they have both won a host of friends. Rev. Rees has proven himself a true evangelist of salvation. His preaching has been vigorous, scriptural and convincing. He has spoken both fearlessly and gently, and the large audiences that have greeted him night after night bear testimony to the fact that the people believe both in him and in his message.

Mrs. Rees possesses a soprano voice of wonderful sweetness and power. Her solos from time to time have been appreciated by all who have heard them, and as a leader of the chorus it would be difficult to find her equal.

There seems to be no disposition to estimate the value of these meetings by numbers, although the number of those who have purposed to live better lives has gone up into the hundreds. To form a true estimate of the value of this evangelistic campaign it must be viewed in its effect upon the religious life of the town. It has been seen in the coming together of christian people irrespective of creed and joining efforts to help people to holier and happier lives, it has enabled the various church families to get better acquainted with each other, it has deepened the bond of fraternal feeling between them, it has established family altars, it has quickened the spiritually cold, and best of all, salvation has come to many who were lost in sin.

MANGLED BODY FOUND ON TRACK

Unknown Unfortunate Killed by
Lehigh Train Last Evening—
Thought to Be Man Who Applied for Work Yesterday.

The mangled remains of a young man were found by a yardman named Updike on the Lehigh Valley tracks opposite the foot of Chemung street at 9 o'clock last night. The decapitated body lay diagonally between the rails. The head and one shoe was on one side of the body, between the rails, and the right arm was on the other side. The left hand and both legs below the knees were both mutilated badly. It is thought that the man was stealing a ride and fell beneath the wheels, and it is estimated that four or five trains passed over the body before it was found.

The man was about 25 years old, 5 feet, 10 inches tall, of slim build, had blue eyes, reddish brown hair, smooth face and aquiline nose. There was nothing on his body by which he could be identified. He wore a straw hat, black clothes and two blue checked gingham shirts. The dead man is supposed to be one of five men who applied for work at the new shop yesterday. None of the men could be found today.

It was reported this morning that the dead man was Joseph Benjamin, who lived near Monroeton. Chief Walsh telegraphed to the authorities at the latter place and they found one of Benjamin's relatives, who said that he did not think it could be the man, but that he would come up this afternoon to see.

The coroner viewed the remains, which were taken to Grumme's undertaking room, this noon, but did not think it necessary to hold an inquest.

Late this afternoon a scar was discovered on the head of the dead man. A bridge builder named Pratt was injured at Waverly recently and should have a similar scar. The doctor who dressed the wound was called this afternoon and will come down to see if he can identify the man.

CURIOUS COLOR CHANGING CHAMELEON

Sam Blish has on exhibition at the Lockhart street store a decided curiosity in the reptilian line. While the leopard cannot change his spots, this beast of Sam's can change the color of its skin apparently at pleasure when its temper is disturbed, or to conform with the color of the objects around it.
