Royal Arcanum Rates

Athens—There has been so much inquiry about the new rates of the Royal Arcanum that we make this explanation. The present payment, due September 30, will be the same as formerly but the change will take place on the October payment, when the new rules will come in force. The Grand Lodge is preparing a list of all members with their attained age, together with the amount they will be required to pay hereafter, so that the collector will have this rate and amount in his hands in time for next payment. Those 65 years of age and over will have the privilege of one half their assessment and the remainder will be charged at 4 per cent compounded annually. Members desiring to take advantage of this privilege must at once execute a paper to that effect on blanks furnished by local secretary, and will not need a new benefit certificate. Those desiring to take advantage of options or to reduce their amounts will require new benefit certificates, and should apply to the local secretary.

Board of Health

Athens—The Board of Health held a meeting last evening with all of its member present. They handed in their report to the borough Secretary of the persons who have complied with the ordinance in regard to testing cows. Several nuisances were reported and health officer George W. Parsons was instructed to look after them and see that they were abated.

Bandits Stop Great Northern Train and Get \$50,000. SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 4.—The east-bound Great Northern passenger train leaving here at 8 o'clock was held up by a gang of bandits ten miles from this city. The express car was blown to pieces by three charges of dynamite.

The robbers are believed to have secured \$50,000 from the wrecked car. Sheriff Smith and a posse of more than 100 men are reported to have surrounded the gang at Spring Beach, ten miles from this city.

A battle is believed to be in progress between the robbers and their pursuers not far from the scene of the holdup, which occurred near Ballard. Charles Anderson, the express messenger, was injured.

The train was flagged near a brickyard, and as the engineer slowed up two men in rain coats climbed over the tender and presented revolvers at his head.

The express messenger was commanded to open the door of his car, and on his refusal to do so a charge of dynamite was placed against it and exploded. The explosion tore the car almost to pieces. The safe was then blown open.

AFTER MONK GIBSON. Military Companies Encamped at Edna to Protect Him if Caught.

EDNA, Tex., Oct. 4.—There is little new in the situation regarding the chase for the negro Monk Gibson, charged with the murder of four members of the Condit family. There are still 200 men in the bottom, who have been searching for miles, with no trace of the negro.

Four companies of military are encamped here in command of Adjutant General Hulen, who has had a number of conferences with the authorities, but there are no developments as yet.

There are now many who believe that the negro must have got away from the bottom or is dead. Every county in this section of the state is now represented among the searchers, and every nook and corner of the county has been gone over. Lynchings have been threatened and a stake and fire prepared.
