#### FOOLING THE COYOTES. Pins of a Montana Man for Ridding Ranges of the Prowling Pest.

The first experiment in ridding Montana ranges of coyotes by means of an infection will be made in Teton and at Suffern, N. J. Chouteau counties, says a Helena (Mont) correspondence to the Anaconda Standard. Dr. E. E. Knowles, under whose directions the experiments are being made, shipped a mangy coyote to Teton county and one to Choutesu They will be turned out on the range by men who will endavor to watch results and make report of them.

At the last session of the legislature an appropriation was made for the purpose of making an experiment in killing coyotes and wolves on the ranges by inoculating them with mange. Several months ago Dr. Knowles secured seven young coyotes. During their confinement two died, but the others are husky. They have all been inoculated with mange, the two that have been sent to Teton and Chouteau showing the disease in a pronounced form. Two of the three that are still in confinement show the disease in a marked way, but the third, while inoculated, appears to be immune so far. Under the law the animals are to be turned loose in different parts of the state

"The matter is an experiment," says Dr. Knowles, "and I have hopes it will prove a successful one. My only fear is that the infected coyotes I turn out may get ha's of a poison before they get suce to spread the disease. I have Teen feeding them meat and they will not be so sharp about letting poisoned meat on the range as are the wild ones. Still, I have hope, as this is the breeding season, that my diseased animals will get around some before they meet death by the poison route. If they live four weeks they will spread the disease to such an extent among the other coyotes in their vicinity that the experiment will get a good start."

## IDEAL HUNTING GROUNDS.

Sehring See Coast Affords Plenty Sport for Gunners and Anglers.

There is probably no country in the world where food is more easily obtained than along the Behring coast in MATINEE AND NIGHT the spring time. Caribou are numerous and, despite the long winters, the flesh of the young bulls is good, writes Belmore H. Browne, in Recreation. Harbor seals frequent the bays, and seal liver with bacon makes a grand breakfast. Sea gulls nest by thousands on the surf-washed islands, and their eggs, they taste fishy when boiled.

Scallops and clams are abundant, and Should thus be formed in one harmonious the waters teem with salmon and cod. The country we hunted was very mountainous, and there was no timber The only wood was willow and alder. The willows are small and do not count much as game cover, but the alders grow to a good size and form tangled thickets. These thickets are the home of the brown bears. In summer, bear hunting is practically impossible, because of the dense growth of grass which covers the country. The grass reaches a height of over six feet, and flourishes on the high mountain sides as well as in the sheltered valleys. At this time of year the ears' skins are worthless.
