**COUNTRY FIREMEN
MADE PROTEST**

They Claim Discrimination and Ill Treatment at Convention Which Is Thrown Into Uproar by the Charge.

Gettysburg gets next year's convention of the state firemen, winning out by a vote of 275 to 224. The following officers were chosen almost unanimously:
President, Aaron J. Henry of Allentown; first vice president, Thos. E. Jones of Pittsburg; second vice president, Bernard Bosch of Oak Lane; third vice president, John L. Lewis of Lansford; fourth vice president, F. J. J. Connelly of New Castle; recording secretary, W. W. Wunder of Reading; corresponding secretary, J. A. Green of Carlisle; treasurer, C. L. Reichenbach of Allentown; delegate to national convention, Dr. G. W. Berntheizel of Columbia.

The report of Secretary Wunder showed the association to have 112,000 members. 885 delegates attended the convention.
Many of the delegates protested at the treatment accorded the delegates from the small towns. They maintained they had been ignored and preference shown the delegates from the large cities. They accused President Berntheizel of discrimination and insinuated the election was carried on illegally. Many of them refused to cast ballots. Some spirited personalities resulted and for a time the convention was in an uproar.

Yesterday was the big day of the convention, it being parade day. About 137 companies were in the line of march, a majority of them with apparatus. Upward of 10,000 firemen were in line, among whom were companies from places in New York, New Jersey and Delaware.
