MAN WHO WANTS TO BUILD SEWER

Waverly—Only a few who heard the lucid explanation of an up-to-date sewer system, made by Roger B. Williams, and only a few who have since met that able young man, are aware that he is an Ithaca man, son of a wealthy resident of the University city.

Mr. Williams was graduated in the class of 1901, and went at once to New York city, where with a class mate he began to follow his profession, that of a sanitary engineer. Although having been in the business only four years and being classed among the youngest engineers of this kind in the country, Messrs. Williams and Whitman have succeeded in a wonderful manner. Their offices in New York now occupy a whole floor, fourteen sanitary experts are employed, in addition to a business force, and the firm has already done work for President Roosevelt at Sagamore Hill, as well as several cities of the southern states.

This same firm of young men made a report to the Sayre borough council on a sewer system, and the governors of both the valley towns are fortunate in having secured bids from Williams & Whitman; if such vast sums are to be spent it is well to know that at least the work would be in safe hands.

In connection with the contracts which Williams & Whitman are endeavoring to secure in Sayre and Waverly, the following from an Ithaca exchange yesterday is of interest:

"The report presented by Roger B. Williams, jr. Thursday night, to the sewer commission, was declared by old city officials and a lawyer who was present, to be the best ever heard in Ithaca municipal history. The deeper the discussion went the reader and more surprising came his answers. The old heads were overwhelmed with the good sense and learning of our

young townsman. The subject was how to improve the sewer system, now ten or eleven years old, and make the lake outflow of our sewage adequate and our present machinery do the necessary work. The board had a plan of its own and called upon Mr. Williams to examine the situation and report upon it. He showed that \$16,000 will do wonders and cover everything that was held reasonable at from \$80,000 to \$100,000."

New Corporation
Waverly—The meeting of the recently formed Monaca Temple Association, held as per notice in the Odd Fellows rooms last evening resulted in the adoption of a set of by-laws and the completion of much other preliminary business.

At another meeting at the same hour and place tomorrow evening officers of the new corporation, which is capitalized at \$15,000, will be elected.

New Line Running.

Waverly—With very little ceremony, the W. S. & A. Traction company Sunday began the operation of the new line connecting the present line and the old belt line, with a new line.

The schedule remains the same, but instead of two cars starting from the Broad street terminal, there are now three. The cars run the same to Sayre, the belt line car runs the same as before, and the additional car, starting west on Broad street runs to Pine street, then to Clinton avenue, to Center, to William, where it connects with the belt line at Chemung and Ithaca streets. The new line serves scores of residents in the section it traverses and besides being a great feeder to the main line to the adjoining towns will be a paying line by itself. Hundreds of Waverly people, out to enjoy the fine weather, hearing of the "new street cars" took their initial trip over the line, the starting of which marks a step in the progress of the valley.
