**BUSINESS MEN TO
QUESTION COUNCIL**

Committee of Directors Appointed Last Evening to Ask Borough Council For Statement of Position Relative to Trolley Franchise

Hon. Mial E. Lilley appeared before the Business Men's association last night and championed the cause of the Athens, Sayre and South Waverly Traction Co., which is applying to the Sayre borough council for a franchise. Mr. Lilley sought to interest the business men in the new company. He said that the company wished to run through Sayre borough and would do so if the community seemed disposed to meet them half way. He said that the proposal to tax the company \$50 a car was not a business proposition. The company would be forced to run its way through West Sayre if the council persisted in its position.

Mr. Lilley asked that the Business Men's association take the matter up directly with the borough council and ask them what the difficulty was. Accordingly a committee of three directors was appointed to take the matter in charge.
