#### Much Discussed Law Suit Ends

Waverly — Attorney F. E. Hawkes of this place as attorney for the New York and Pennsylvania Telephone and Telegraph (Bell) company received yesterday a decision handed down by Judge Lyon of the supreme court in the case of Averetta Parsons of North Waverly against the Bell company. The case aroused much interest here a year ago and caused discussion. The decision makes the contest a draw.

The law suit, in which F. E. Hawkes was opposed by attorney Sebring of Corning and ex-district attorney F. A. Darrow of Owego, arose from the effort of the telephone company to run a line to Lockwood, to accomplish which they had to pass the property of the Parsons'. Mrs. Parsons owns the place and the suit therefor is in her name. Her husband conducts a blacksmith shop at North Waverly, and in front of the driveway leading into his shop a pole was placed. The location of this pole was the principle point of contest. According to Justice Lyon's decision, the plaintiff, Parsons is awarded six cents damages, the cost of the action is placed on the defendant company, the obnoxious pole remains in its place, but certain wires must be changed somewhat.

Out of the original suit came a second action to punish for contempt of court certain parties to the affair. An attempt was made to show contempt in that an in-

junction restraining the defendants from carrying on any of the necessary operations had been disregarded. It was shown, however, that the injunction had been disregarded on the advice of attorney Hawkes, and Judge Lyon dismissed the action on the ground that the wording of said injunction did not sufficiently describe the boundaries of the land in dispute. Those named as defendants in this action were Charles Gunderman, Joseph Bingham, Lon Stever and George Sweet.

#### Good Officers Elected

Waverly — Much was accomplished at the meeting of directors of Waverly's latest new corporation, the Monaca Temple Association. The most important matter was the election of officers which resulted as follows:—President, C. O. Hoagland; Vice president, S. Zausmer; Secretary, F. A. Bell; Treasurer, Seward Baldwin.

The elections puts the business of the new organization into able and enterprising hands, and it is stated that the Tioga House block at the earliest possible moment will be converted into the best business block in the village. The corporation is capitalized at \$15,000, half of which is already subscribed and a mortgage placed for the balance. \$13,000 will be paid for the part of the hotel property to be purchased and \$2000 spent in the alternations which are to be commenced at an early date. Applications for space have already been received and the stock apparently is a good, sound investment. The Tioga block is exceptionally well built.

The names of the directors are the officers above mentioned and S. A. Genung, Wesley Brougham, F. S. Morgan, I. G. Dodge, Louis Lord, J. VanEtten and W. E. Baker.

**SCIENTIFIC PURPOSES.**  
Classification of Merchant Vessels Chartered by Carnegie Institution.

Department of commerce and navigation has consented to the classification of the Galilee, a merchant vessel chartered by the Carnegie Institution for scientific purposes, as a pleasure boat, and the customs collector at Philadelphia, where the Galilee has been chartered, will be instructed accordingly. This action, reports the Washington Star, is taken at the request of the department of terrestrial magnetism of the Carnegie Institution, and under unnecessary the entry and passage of the Galilee at every foreign port of call, which she would do as a merchantman, she would be entered and clear at each port, and she is being used for scientific purposes exclusively, she has no cargo to be entered or cleared.
