SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION

The eleventh annual convention of the Bradford County Sunday School Association will be held at Sayre, Tuesday and Wednesday, October 24 and 25; and at Camp-town on Thursday and Friday, October 26 and 27. The program and speaking will be the same at each place. Each school in the county is expected to have representatives at one or the other of the above places. Free entertainment will be provided for two delegates but when more than this number are sent from one school, the committee cannot promise that

the extra ones will be entertained free.

The program which has been prepared for the convention is a strong one.

The general summary of the schools for the county, made by Mrs. Marion Schmauch, statistical secretary, shows the following totals: No. of schools, 179, of which 132 are open the year 'round; four teachers' training classes; 48 separate rooms for primary pupils; 12 cradle rolls; 14 home departments, 2,062 officers and teachers; 12,014 pupils of all ages; total enrollment of 14,796; 508 joined a church or were confirmed.
