Waverly—The west bound Erie passenger trains were delayed at this station for some hours owing to a wreck caused by the bucking up of a west-bound freight train just east of Wellsburg at about 8 o'clock last evening. No lives were lost nor injuries sustained but the general confusion and delay was added to when a fast east-bound freight smashed into the derailed and overturned box cars. Local train No. 19, due to leave here at 8:32 p. m., could not get away until nearly 11 o'clock; it was then obliged to follow No. 3, the New York express, which arriving late, was held here about half an hour. The breaking of an air hose caused the wreck. Both tracks were cleared by 11 o'clock by the Elmira wrecking crew.
