FUTILE FIRING FOLLOWS FUGITIVE

Waverly—In a desperate attempt to escape the clutches of the law, a prisoner leaped through the door of Justice Hoagland's office, nearly knocking ex Senator W. E. Johnson down a flight of stairs, as he fled yesterday afternoon.

Pursued by Special Officer Blazinski, the fugitive flew up Broad street, the officer firing his revolver in the air as he ran, and scores of people joined in the chase.

The daring escape followed the arrest of the stranger whose name is supposed to be O'Connor. He was arrested on complaint of a foreigner, who went with his story to Blazinski, who spoke his language. The foreigner, it appears, had drawn two months' pay and had other money to the amount of \$280. He was about the old Christie house during the day and was advised by a friend to put the money in a bank. This he did, receiving a certificate of deposit.

He retained \$10, and later in the day was joined by some men who made themselves very companionable. A walk to the vicinity of Spanish Hill was suggested and taken, and at a lonely spot, the foreigner declares, the men seized him, threatening to kill him if he did not give up his money. Seeing the new certificate they allowed him to go, taking the \$10.

After telling his story to Blazinski and securing a warrant, several places were visited, and they met a man whom the foreigner positively identified as one of the party who held him up. Blazinski took the man before the justice and during the examination Dr. Johnson came into Mr. Hoagland's office to transact business. As the door opened O'Connor bolted and was fleet enough to reach the state line.

He was one of the widely known men in this section of the state and his countless friends will be glad that his fatal illness was short and without any great suffering. Funeral services will be held on Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock at Christ church. The interment will be made in Oak Hill cemetery.

Mr. Mercur took a prominent part in the business, political, social and religious life of this place and his career was of inestimable advantage in developing the resources of Towanda and the country lying round about. His death will remove one of the strong men of the county, and will cause to be paid to his memory a deep felt tribute of appreciation from every citizen.

Stack was walking upon the westbound track intent upon his duties of trackwalker, and did not see the fast train approaching. His body was terribly mangled.

He was 62 years of age and had lived for many years at Wyalusing. He was a brother of Michael Stack the well known Lehigh Valley foreman, with whom he made his home.
