RETIRING EDITOR GIVEN A SMOKER

The Friends of Mr. Cunningham Gather Around the Board to Bid Him God-speed.

Waverly—At the head of a table around which sat a group of representative business and professional men, and under a soft blue cloud of floating Havana vapor, H. E. Cunningham said farewell to a few friends who "happened to drop in" last evening. For the past six months Mr. Cunningham has been working in Sayre as city editor of The Valley Record. He came to Sayre from Greater New York, leaving a more lucrative position on the Brooklyn Citizen to gain the quiet and, to him, more tasteful life of a smaller town. He is a native of Vermont, a graduate of the University of Vermont, and leaves Sayre now to accept a position offered him in his home state on the Montpelier Evening Argus.

Since coming to Sayre Mr. Cunningham has done much to bring the highest kind of credit to the greatest of all callings. Clean, manly, modest and energetic, he is one of a type that it were well to have more of; and his departure is a matter of regret both to his employer and to his friends.

W. T. Carey, the well known city editor of the Sayre Times, succeeds Mr. Cunningham on The Valley Record. His work is too well known to need lengthy comment, and his friends are numbered by hundreds.

DID NOT KNOW IT WAS LOADED

Waverly—A flobert rifle in the hands of boys almost too young to be entrusted with an air gun, and a bullet sent from the gun which was supposed not to be loaded, is responsible for the dangerous condition of young Basil Brown, who was shot by a companion in South Waverly, while the young Nimrods were trying to scalp sparrows.

It was at first believed he was seriously injured, and he was taken to the Packer hospital, where Chief Surgeon Ott and his assistants worked for some time at the wound, an ugly one. Late in the evening it was announced that the injury was not necessarily fatal.
