ELMIRA GIANTS WENT DOWN TO DEFEAT

Saturday's Red Hot Foot Ball Game Resulted in Victory for Waverly Team

Waverly—That interest in football is not dead here was made evident in the good sized crowd attending the game Saturday afternoon on the Howard street grounds, when eleven Elmira Giants went down to defeat before the W. H. S. team. The score was 10-0 in favor of Waverly.

From the first whistle the playing was hard and fast, and time had to be taken out at frequent intervals for injuries. Fast as was the game, however, it is to the credit of both teams and referees that there was no unseemly quarrelling or disputes. Neither side was able to score in the first half, the ball being forced slowly yard by yard, first one way then back. In the second half, by a succession of quick plays, Waverly secured a touchdown and followed this up with another after eleven minutes of play.

Quarterback "Pete" Vannostran, who ran the team, used great judgment in his signals, and Captain Hogan with his combination of ground gainers seldom failed to make the distance.

This makes the fifth consecutive victory for the Waverly team. The boys have showed that they can make good and a paying crowd turned out Saturday. Now is the time for the management to make a hit. Give us another game and Waverly will turn out and pay and root and congratulate.

New Rails Arrive

Waverly—That the W. S. & A. Traction company certainly mean to perform all their promise is shown once again now by the arrival of seven carloads of the finest steel rails, which were ordered some time ago.

The rails are 75 pound "T" rails of latest make and design, which means that they are heavy enough to support a railroad train. FEVER BROUGHT POSTCARDS

Young Woman Prostrated by Typhoid Receives Them from All Over the World.

There is a certain young woman in New York who can thank typhoid fever for giving her a remarkably fine collection of souvenir postal cards. Since her illness began, and she was taken to a hospital, her family and friends have entertained and cheered her up by mail, whenever visiting was not considered judicious. She is not strong enough to read letters, but she delights in looking at pictures, and her friends literally ransack the shops looking for novel and pretty picture postcards.

The result is, states the New York Press, that she has a full set of New York views, including street scenes, the parks, the principal churches, monuments, the water front and nearby beaches. All friends or acquaintances going away are requested to send her something, so her collection includes mountain scenery, lakes, seashore views and places of interest in other towns. The seeker for these postcards will find all sorts of views as well from the Scottish crags and lakes to the Alps, from Margate and Brighton to Trouville, Paris, London, Japan, Rome and Naples. Then there are the illustrated songs and the English jokes, the new Yiddish cards, and a great variety of beautiful cards with floral designs.

Many of the best and most popular works of art are now reproduced on postal cards in all the original colors. In fact, there is hardly anything that can't be found on a postal card these days, and the sale is steadily increasing. For the sick nothing could be more appropriate, for they linger at a glance, they please the eye without taxing the intellect and they beguile many a moment for the invalid.

DEAD HANDS GUIDE SHIP.

Helmsman Dies at Wheel, But Grip of Corpses Holds Vessel True to Her Course.

Honolulu.—Held to her course by the death grip of a corpse, the schooner Charles Levy Woodbury weathered a stiff gale on the night of August 8, and after many days of storm and rough weather reached this port from Laysan Island.

The dead helmsman was a Japanese, who complained of feeling ill when he went on watch. Another member of the crew stood with him for a time, but as he seemed to get better his companion left him alone.

The schooner ran into a high wind and rough seas that night, and through it all the Japanese held the boat to its course.

When death relieved him his body fell forward over the spokes of the wheel in such a manner as to wedge them, and he was not found until morning.

The Woodbury is the schooner for which the United States tug Iroquois recently left here to search, when she was long overdue from Laysan.

Capt. Harris, who was in command, says that his vessel was swept along at the rate of nine knots an hour without a stitch of canvas on her. He gave up hope of saving her, and said good-by to Capt. Schlemmer of Laysan, who was a passenger.

Bulwarks were knocked away to keep the decks clear of water, and oil was poured on the water.

Unique Lighthouse.

The most extraordinary of all British lighthouses is to be found on Arnish rock, Stornoway bay—a rock which is separated from the island of Lewis by a channel over 500 feet wide. On this rock a conical beacon is erected, and on its summit a lantern is fixed, from which, night after night, shines a light which is seen by the fishermen far and wide. The way in which this lighthouse is illuminated is this. On the island of Lewis is a lighthouse, and from a window in the tower a stream of light is projected on to a mirror in the lantern on the summit of Arnish rock.
