### WATER MAIN BROKE IN THREE PLACES

**Gang of Men Under Supt. Loetzer Work Nearly All Night Making Repairs**

The Sayre Water company had its troubles yesterday afternoon caused by a break in one of the mains on North Thomas avenue. The main broke at a point where it crosses the Lehigh Valley sewer and for some hours the water pressure on the east side of the tracks was perceptibly diminished. A gang of men under the direction of Supt. Loetzer immediately went to work to repair the main which had been broken in three places. The work was not completed until an early hour this morning, the men having worked nearly all night. Today the mains are furnishing the usual water supply.

### BRICK PLANT BEGAN OPERATIONS TODAY

**Sayre's New Industry Promises to Revolutionize This Particular Business**

The plant of the Federal Granite Brick Co., which is located on the road leading from Milltown to the state line ferry, was put in active operation this morning. It is a marvel of the brickmaking industry and bids fair to revolutionize the business.

The bricks are made of lime and sand; those being made today are 6 parts lime and 94 parts sand. This proportion varies according to the color or quality desired.

On the third day after the material is brought into the factory it is ready for use in construction work. The entire plant is equipped with a system of conveyors and elevators, so that the material is handled only by machinery. The sand is placed in a bin and thoroughly dried; it is then conveyed on a large concave belt to a hopper where all fine stones are sifted out, it is then mixed with lime in the desired proportion, and passes on a conveyor to a large revolving cylinder containing very hard spherical stones about the size of a goose egg. These stones are imported from Germany. The sand and lime is thoroughly ground together in the cylinder and conveyed from it to a water mixer, and after being thoroughly mixed it is raised by an elevator and dumped into a large bin where it remains a day to allow the lime to slack. It is then conveyed to the machine that presses it into brick. This puts a pressure of 40 tons upon each brick and was turning them out at the rate of 16,800 a day. The plant has a capacity of 22,000 brick a day. The brick are piled on small cars and run into a large cylinder 6 feet in diameter and 77 feet long. The cylinder holds 24,000 and when filled is closed airtight and steam pressure of 125 pounds is turned into it. This gives a temperature of 360 degrees and melts the sand and lime together, giving it the consistency of stone. When taken from the cylinder the brick are ready for use. The industry will require 25 men after it is in full operation.

### WAS A GRAND SALE

H. A. Kaufman has been compelled to close his sale for two days in order to arrange the stock and re-mark the same. The sale which he has been conducting for the past nine days is one of the grandest ever held in this part of the country. Owing to the big crowd thousands of people were compelled to go away without being waited upon. There is still a \$25,000 stock to be disposed of and the sale will reopen Thursday at 9:30 a. m.
