HE CHAMPIONED

ANTI-SLAVERY

Memory of John R. Giddings,

Born in Athens Township, Recalled at Protection Hose Anniversary Exercises

Athens—The retrospective glance in the 50th anniversary of Protection hose company brings to mind one great champion of the anti-slavery controversy that agitated the country before the civil war, and conducted to that aroused public sentiment that sharply defined the principles of freedom and emancipation. That man was Joshua R. Giddings who was born Oct. 6, 1795, in a house that stood on a knoll below Morley's crossing. When yet an infant his parents moved to Canandaigua, and ten years later to Asthabula, Ohio, where he lived at the time we saw him in Athens when he visited the place of his birth before the civil war broke out.

He had served as a soldier in the War of 1812 and was in a desperate battle with the Indians near Sandusky bay, where one-fifth his regiment were killed or wounded. In 1826 he was chosen to the Ohio state legislature and was sent to congress in 1838 where he championed the cause of the abolition of the slave trade, and from that time on he rose in prominence until he became one of the foremost leaders in debates and measures looking to the freedom of the slaves. In the height of this slavery agitation he aroused the southern leaders to such a frenzy that at one time one of the hot headed members arose in his seat and began to interrupt him. He replied with a personal invective against those who were in league with the devil to perpetuate a system of barbarism that was a disgrace to the time in which we live. The southern member got to a white heat of excitement and challenged him to settle the matter on the field of honor. Mr. Giddings, in his dignity said: "I accept your challenge, and we will settle it now at this moment and the weapons I choose are those God Almighty has provided. Come on." This cooled the ardor of the southern champion and there was no duel, but Giddings was a hero from that time.

Mr. Edward Herrick, Jr. sent an invitation to Mr. Giddings to come to Athens soon after this episode

in his life and he came. We remember the occasion and that the older settlers were present at the reception in Patrick's old hall. A. H. Spalding presided at the meeting and made a fine speech, after which Mr. Giddings gave us one of his inspiring addresses that fired all his listeners with the great idea of slavery emancipation. Afterwards the party consisting of Hon. C. L. Ward of Towanda, Mr. Giddings, Mr. Spalding and Mr. Herrick drove down to the scene of Mr. Giddings' birthplace and talked over the early surroundings of that country. It was near here that the Indian Queen Esther had her palace and Mr. Giddings had some very exciting stories of her to relate. Mr. Giddings died in Montreal, Canada in 1864, while the war was in progress, but he lived to see the great doctrines he had advocated nearly realized in the arbitrament of the sword.

Installing Gas Engine
