PENNYPACKER TO ROOSEVELT.

Governor Asks For Inquiry Into De-

HARRISBURG, Pa., Oct. 25.—Gov. Erner Pennypacker last night made public the following copy of a letter which he has sent to President Roosevelt asking for a federal investigation into the affairs of the Enterprise National bank of Allegheny.

"The Enterprise National bank, doing business in Allegheny, has recently failed, having at the time among its deposits \$1,030,000 of the moneys of this commonwealth. These moneys were deposited upon the faith of the stability of the institution, arising through its organization as a national bank, and because of these deposits the commonwealth is much interested in the ascertainment of the condition of its financial affairs.

"Our commissioner of banking has no control over it and no power to make any such investigation. Since it was organized under federal law and subject to your supervision I write to ask that a full, complete and careful investigation may be made so that everything connected with the condition of its affairs and the causes which have led to such condition may be fully disclosed. I am ready to render all the assistance in my power to secure a thorough ascertainment of the facts."

FIGHT FOLLOWS COLLEGE RUSH

Chicago Police Arrested Fifteen Freshmen Students.

CHICAGO, Oct. 25.—Twenty-five policemen and 200 students of the Chicago College of Dental Surgery fought here following a class "rush," and fifteen students were arrested. The police fired several shots in the air to frighten the students.

The freshmen and the junior classes of the dental school met in their annual class rush, and the scrimmaging became so desperate that a riot call was sent to two police stations.

When the police arrived the struggle between the students had been in progress half an hour and had blocked all the traffic in nearby streets. The students joined forces at the approach of the patrol wagons, and the policemen were pelted with stones and vegetables, while water was poured on them by students from the upper floors of the college.

The policemen felt that they were losing ground and fired several shots. This brought the students to a halt, and the policemen rushed on them with clubs.

This treatment drove the students in all directions, but the police made fifteen arrests. Several students were severely bruised.
