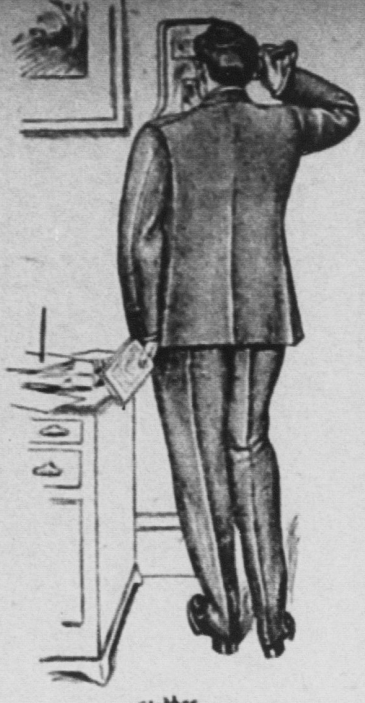

**THE SUNDAY SCHOOL
CONVENTION CLOSES**

Interesting Addresses by Delegates Were Features of Yesterday's Sessions—40 Schools Organized in Bradford County During Past Year

The closing session (so far as Sayre is concerned) of the eleventh annual convention of the Bradford County Sabbath School Association was held in the Methodist church last night. There was a large attendance and the program was carried out to the letter. The afternoon session was an interesting one, the principal features of which were two decidedly instructive and thoughtful addresses which were listened to with great attention and evident profit. The address of the Rev. Homer C. Snitcher on "Enthusiasm" was a masterly effort and contained excellent advice as to creating interest in the Sunday school work.

Before adjournment there was a business meeting at which the following officers for the ensuing year were elected: President, Rev. J. W. Martin of Canton; first vice president, Rev. M. B. Wood of Sayre; second vice president, Rev. H. Jones of Neath; recording secretary, Miss Balliet of Sayre; treasurer, H. J. Halleck; secretary home department, Miss Mary Boyle; secretary normal department, Rev. C. A. Brady; primary department, Mrs. Wm. Lilley.

The sum of \$25 was donated to the state association.

An important feature in the business meeting was the large increase in the number of Sunday schools in Bradford county during the past year. The report showed that 40 new schools had been organized, due largely to the efforts of P. B. Waterhouse, a student of Princeton college, who is an enthusiast in the work, and his efforts received deserved commendation.

The evening session was well attended. A praise and devotional service was followed by two addresses which were of an interesting and helpful character.

This morning the delegates, numbering seventy, left for Camp town, where the two days' program will be repeated.

**THEY PREFER TO
REMAIN AT HOME**

According to Wilkesbarre Papers Machinists in That Place Do Not Want to Come to Sayre

The newsmongers in the Wilkesbarre and Hazelton daily papers are evidently putting forth their best efforts to discourage the men who have been working in the shops at the former place from coming to Sayre. According to a story recently published it appears that E. A. Mitchell of South Bethlehem, superintendent of motive power of the Lehigh Valley, and E. T. James, shop superintendent at Sayre, and Charles Wilson, master mechanic of the Wilkesbarre shops, visited the shops at the West End, Wilkesbarre, the other day and asked every man employed there to go to Sayre and take a position in the new shops. The story further relates that the move was made very quietly and that the men were approached separately. One of the employes is said to have stated afterward that the officials even went so far as to coax the men to go to Sayre.

It is alleged that the men refused to go to Sayre on the grounds that the place was small, amusements were limited and the only employment offered for their children is in the shops or out on the railroad. It is said that the officials met with almost unanimous refusal on the part of the men, notwithstanding that in some instances the latter were offered weekly passes, thus enabling them to continue to live in Wilkesbarre and go home every Saturday night.

A rumor is current among the railroad men on the Lehigh Valley that the Jersey Central road is about to increase its force at Ashley, and that this fact is largely instrumental in influencing the men to remain in Wilkesbarre.

Just how much truth there is in any of these stories is a difficult matter to ascertain. The Lehigh officials in this place are non-committal.

**PIPE LINE INSPECTOR
VISITS THIS SECTION**

Interesting Details Connected With His Official Duties.

E. J. Quigley and wife of Oil City are guests at the Norwood in Waverly today. Mr. Quigley is inspector for the United States Pipe Line Company and his duties are of an interesting nature. Ordinarily the company pumps export oil of the cheaper grade through their line but from time to time a high grade quality is needed at the seaboard and as the same pipe is used for pumping both kinds of oil it is necessary for an inspector to visit the various stations and determine by tests when the inferior oil has stopped flowing and the higher quality begins. At the present time a 30,000 barrel batch of high grade oil is being forced through the line from Bradford and today Mr. Quigley will visit the station below Athens for the purpose of ascertaining when it arrives. The export or inferior grade of oil bears 110 degrees test while the "water white," or high grade oil, is tested at 150 degrees. In order to ascertain the difference between the two oils Mr. Quigley depends upon the color, using the eye only, but sometimes the hydrometer is brought into service to determine the specific gravity. The export grade shows yellow while the water white is colorless. When he visits the station below Athens today Mr. Quigley will make a thorough test and when he has discovered that the high grade oil has reached that point he will immediately proceed to Wilkesbarre where he will repeat the operation. From Wilkesbarre he will go to the next station and so on until the seaboard is reached, and at the latter place the high grade oil will be diverted into separate tanks. Mr. Quigley will not be compelled to use undue haste in reaching Wilkesbarre, as it will be forty hours before the high grade oil reaches that city after he has determined that it has passed the pumping station at Athens. Mr. Quigley completed his task in this section this afternoon and will leave for Wilkesbarre in the morning.

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**WILL ASK FOR BETTER
U. S. MAIL SERVICE**

The Postmasters of Towanda and Sayre Will Unite in Urging Lehigh to Improve the Present Conditions

A concentrated effort is being made by the postmasters of Sayre and Towanda to secure better morning mail and passenger service on the Lehigh Valley. Postmaster Turner of Towanda has for some time past been striving to gain this end, and recently he has caused a petition to be circulated among the business men of the county seat which requests the Lehigh Valley to provide better mail facilities. As matters in this direction now stand the citizens of Sayre are unable to get the Philadelphia and New York papers and other mail until nearly noon. Residents of Waverly are provided with a morning mail which reaches that place at 9 o'clock. The western section of Bradford county, through which the Northern Central runs, also gets an early morning mail, and the Lehigh officials will be urged to provide as good service, at least, for this section of the county. Deputy Postmaster Price has a petition which he has been presenting to the business men of Sayre today, and he has already secured a large number of signatures.

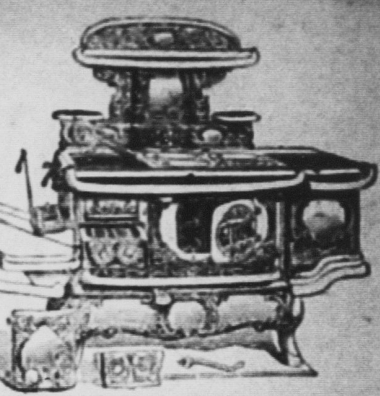

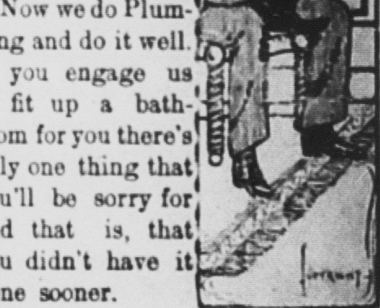
