Twelve people in the building escaped by jumping from the second and third story windows; loss, \$25,000.

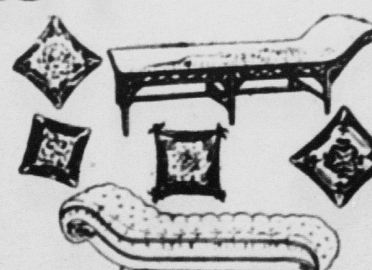
Missing Italian's Body Found.
