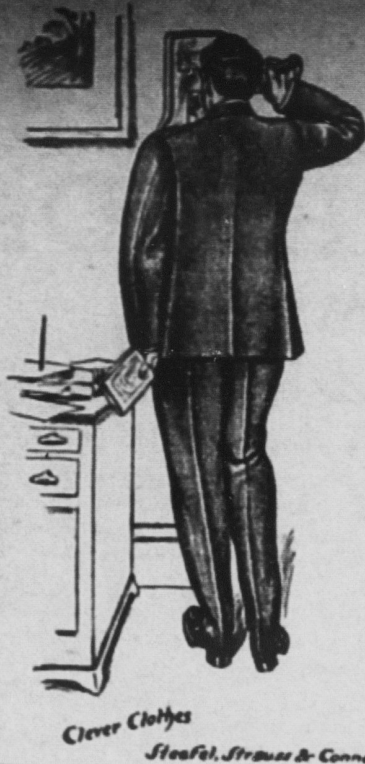

**JOHN McCANN HELD  
ON WOMAN'S CHARGE**

Gave Bail in the Sum of Three Hundred Dollars for Appearance to Next Court of Quarter Sessions

At a hearing held before Justice John R. Murray this morning John P. McCann, a hostler in the Lehigh Valley round house at this place, was held to the next court of quarter sessions in the sum of \$300 on the complaint of Mrs. John Geiss, nee Anna Herman, who charged the defendant with being responsible for her condition. The hearing was held in Justice Murray's private room. Mrs. Geiss, who was married August 9, testified that her intimacy with McCann began last April. A number of witnesses were sworn for the prosecution and were subjected to a rigid cross-examination by Hon. L. T. Hoyt, attorney for McCann. The defense offered no evidence and at the conclusion of the hearing McCann was held as above stated. Attorney C. C. Youm appeared in behalf of Mrs. Geiss. The latter's husband did not appear in court.

**WANT LIGHTS ON  
HOSPITAL PLACE**

Residents Say That the Darkness Which Pervades That Locality Is a Matter of Considerable Inconvenience

People residing on Hospital place very much deplore the fact that there are no lights in that neighborhood and many of them are seriously contemplating bringing the matter to the attention of the borough council. This morning a resident of the locality stated to a Record representative that when there is no moon shining it is almost impossible to get through certain portions of the street with safety. In fact it was asserted that mischievously inclined boys take advantage of the fact that there are no lights on the street and stretch ropes across the sidewalk and also place other obstructions which make it highly dangerous for pedestrians. **MORE WILKES-BARRE  
MEN HERE TODAY**

Arrived in Sayre This Noon and Are Looking Over New Shops

Another delegation from Wilkes-Barre arrived in Sayre at noon today for the purpose of looking over the situation at the new Lehigh Valley shops. There were 30 young men in the party, the majority of whom are machinists. They come here at the request of the Lehigh officials to inspect the shops and also take a look about the town. The men have been employed at the shops at Wilkes-Barre and have been offered situations in Sayre. They are not the same men who were here on Saturday on a similar mission.

Several of the party were interviewed by a Record representative shortly after their arrival. As they had been in Sayre but a few minutes they were not in a position to say anything definite regarding the result of their visit. They did say, however, that the story in yesterday's Wilkes-Barre Record to the effect that thirty employees of the shops had come to Sayre was without foundation, and so far as they knew only one or two men had definitely decided to locate here.

The delegation which arrived here today are all young men, and judging from their conversation it will be a difficult matter for the Lehigh officials to induce them to leave Wilkes-Barre.

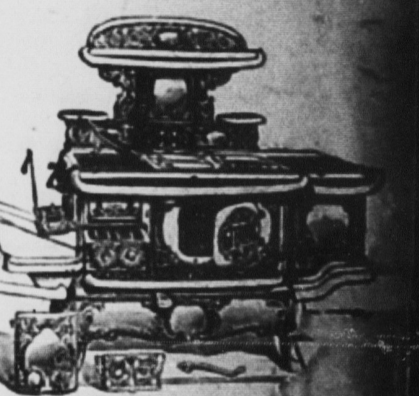
