

**HEALTH STATISTICS
DURING PAST MONTH**

Twenty-two Cases of Contagious and Infectious Diseases Were Returned to the Local Health Board in October

The record in the secretary's office of the board of health shows that there have been twelve cases of scarlet fever reported to the local health authorities during the month of October, nine cases of typhoid fever, and one case of diphtheria. All of these are of a contagious or infectious nature and are so reported to the board of health. The following were reported as having typhoid: W. L. Johnson of Hopkins street, Frank Keeney of Desmond street, Edward Brown of Cayuga avenue, James Carroll of Allison street, Lena C. Bodie of Spring street, Charles Williams of South Elmer avenue, George Burgess of Keystone avenue, Mrs. C. H. Barden of North Lehigh avenue, Coleman Hassler of Hopkins street. Those who were reported as having scarlet fever are as follows: Robert, son of Richard Hill; Laura, daughter of John Curry; Lena, daughter of Edward Cox; Irene, daughter of Chas. Valentine; Mrs. Edward Cox; Hazel, daughter of Joseph Farrell; Maggie, daughter of Michael Boyle; May, daughter of Wm. Lamonte; Hattie, daughter of J. B. Randolph; Whitney, son of Grant Keeney; Michael, son of Michael Boyle; Hattie, daughter of M. K. Jones. The single case of diphtheria was in the family of Guy Cassidy, his daughter Esther being the sufferer. A remarkable feature in connection with the above report is that no deaths have occurred from any of the diseases named. One case of scarlet fever has been reported to the health board this month, a notice of which appears in another column.

**COXE DEAL FORMALLY
CLOSED YESTERDAY**

Lehigh Valley is Now in Possession of Railroad and Mines

The Lehigh Valley yesterday formally took possession of the holdings of Coxe Bros. & Co., incorporated, the big coal operators, the purchase of whose property was authorized at a meeting of the directors of the road held October 23. The entire estate was purchased for \$18,400,000, the Lehigh Valley assuming the payment of \$600,000 for equipment. After the documents for transferring the property had been signed the directors of the Coxe interests resigned. A reorganization of the directors with E. B. Thomas as president was immediately effected. The Coxe deal is one of the largest that has occurred in railroad circles in years and gives the Lehigh Valley control of coal lands of almost inestimable value, besides a large amount of railroad property.

**ANOTHER CASE OF
SCARLET FEVER**

Was Quarantined Last Night by Health Officer Brougham

Another case of scarlet fever has been reported to the local health authorities and this time the victim is Joseph Wales, a young man about 16 years of age, residing with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Wales, 214 South Waverly. The matter was reported to the secretary of the board of health by Dr. Higgins yesterday afternoon and health officer Brougham placed the house under quarantine last night. There are already several cases under quarantine, but the major part of them are in light form.

**LEHIGH VALLEY
RAILROAD NOTES**

Recent Events That Have Occurred in Connection With That Great Iron Highway

The shops at Weatherly closed an hour earlier than usual last night on account of the monthly appropriation for expenses having been exhausted. Each month a certain sum is appropriated for the expense of running the shops and when this is expended work must stop until the following month. The appropriation is large and it is seldom that it is exceeded. At the present time there is a large amount of work to be done in the shops at Weatherly, but regardless of the press of work operations must cease. Yesterday morning the men went to work again, however, and will labor overtime in order to reduce the rush to normal conditions.

A Polish farmer, whose name is unknown, met a horrible death on the Lehigh Valley at Mt. Carmel yesterday. He was driving a load of hay over a crossing and had nearly reached the centre of the tracks when a freight train came rushing along. The farmer evidently became bewildered as he would have been able to save himself. Instead he jumped to the tracks and endeavored to force his team and load across. The engine hit him, knocked him down and the wheels of the forward trucks cut off both legs. He was hurried to a hospital, but his injuries are believed to be fatal.

John McAvoy, a Lehigh conductor, is gradually regaining the use of his right arm which was injured in an accident at Weatherly some time ago.

Engine 237 was turned out of the Lehigh Valley shops this morning, having been for the past several days undergoing repairs. It belongs on the Wyoming division and is used in the mountain service.

HOBSON TO LECTURE

Notwithstanding the inclement weather of last evening there was an excellent attendance at the State University auditorium to greet Captain Richmond Pearson Hobson of Merrimac fame in his lecture on "The Navy." That all were fully repaid for braving the elements was evidenced by the interest manifested and approval accorded by the audience. He has a pleasing address and an exceeding well modulated voice. His lecture gave evidence of a careful study of the resources, history, potentialities and duty of the United States as compared to Europe.—Austin, (Texas) Statesman.


