SCHOOL BUILDINGS SEVERELY CRITICISED

Department of Education Says They are Unfit for School Purposes—Recommends the Erection of New High School Building

Waverly—At the meeting of the School board last evening a letter was received from the State Department of Education dated at Albany Oct. 23, 1905. State Inspector Hail was in Waverly some time ago, and the criticisms in the letter are based on his report. The letter states that the condition of the buildings is not only unsatisfactory but deserves severe criticism, especially that used for the High and Grammar schools. It is stated that the light is not properly arranged and is insufficient; that the seating capacity of the Grammar school room is much too limited for the number attending; that the basement is in bad shape, floors decayed and stairs not properly arranged; that the toilet rooms are much too small, and that, most surprising of all, there is no system of ventilation.

The proximity of a barn on the south is also condemned, as the stench at times renders some of the rooms almost unbearable. The inspector considered that it was impracticable to remodel the building, and expressed doubt as to its being absolutely safe in its present condition.

All the other buildings are criticised on their condition as to light, seating, ventilation and toilet accommodation, with the exception of the west end building, which is highly commended and pronounced first class in every way.

Attention is called to section 31, article 1, revised rules of the board of Regents, which provides that no school shall share in the apportionment for quota and attendance unless it provides a building approved by the commissioner of education, and the letter states that Waverly shall be refused its apportionment unless steps are taken toward providing new buildings. It is recommended that more land be purchased near the high school building and a new one be erected and that the use of the old one be continued during the construction of the new. The letter is signed by Frank H. Wood, chief inspection division.

Members of the board when interviewed said they did not consider conditions as bad as the letter would seem to indicate; that it is part of a general movement on the part of the State board to secure better buildings, and that they thought the difficulties would be overcome without any very great expense.

DIED LAST NIGHT

Waverly—Mrs. Patrick Lynch died at 7 o'clock last evening at her home in South Waverly. She had been an invalid for a number of years and is survived by her husband, four sons and one daughter. The funeral will be held next Monday morning from the house and from the church at 9:30.

A VENGEFUL ITALIAN.

Almost a Tragedy at New York City

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—While descending the steps leading to the rear entrance of the city hall on her way to be married Marguerite Audite, a young Italian woman, was attacked by a former sweetheart, who slashed her on the face and neck with a razor. Screaming hysterically so that her cries were heard all through the building, the woman staggered along the hall for a few feet and then fell fainting to the stone floor.

Her assailant attempted to run away, but the prospective bridegroom of the young woman, Rocco Tenare, ran after him, at the same time shouting loudly for help. His cries were heard by Policeman Daniel Maloney of the city hall squad, who chased the fleeing man across the park, and finally captured him. He was arrested and taken to the city hall station, where he gave his name as Annulo. Suffering greatly from the razor wounds, the young woman was removed to the Hudson Street hospital.

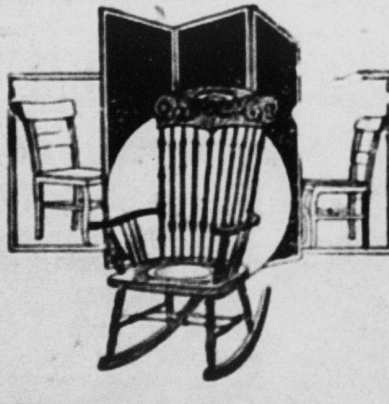
