PRINCE JOHN OF BELGRADE.

Prince John Merkwitsch Was First Cousin to King Peter I.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Prince John Merkwitsch, as he was known here for nearly sixty years, during which time he followed the trade of a furrier, is dead here and will be buried under his long abandoned title of Prince John of Belgrade. Merkwitsch was a first cousin of the present ruler of Serbia, King Peter I., his mother being Princess Helena of the house of Karagorjevitich and his father Count Stephen Nicholas.

When fifteen years of age the boy John sparred with his father and came to this country, where he learned the trade which he afterward followed. He wrote home that nobility was no longer a matter of concern to him in a free country where all men were sovereign. Since then he held no communication with his noble relatives until his cousin ascended the throne of Serbia, when he sent his congratulations as a kinsman.

The old man's coffin bears a silver plate embossed with the royal arms of Serbia and the inscription, "Prince John of Belgrade, Servia, died Nov. 2, 1905."

The interment took place today in the Lutheran cemetery.

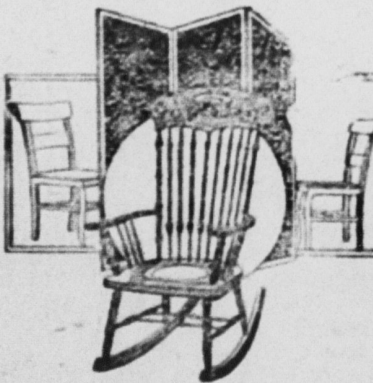
