BOARD OF TRUSTEES

HELD A MEETING

Sewer Plans Prove Unsatisfactory and Will Be Submitted to State Board for Final Decision

Waverly—The regular monthly meeting of the board of trustees of this village was held last Saturday evening. Those present were President Tucker, Trustees Lord, Gennung, Osborne, Myers, Brown and Brougham.

A resolution was passed retaining M. M. Tompkins and Randolph Horton as associates of Judge F. A. Bell in the matter of taking over the water works. C. C. Remale of New York city was employed as consulting engineer to aid the board in determining the value of the water works and to obtain sufficient knowledge of the plant to qualify as an expert in the case.

The village attorney reported that an expert and himself had gone over the sewer plan very carefully; that in many parts of the village the pipes would be too near the surface and that basements could not be drained, and the proposed sewer pipes coincided in depth with the water pipes, requiring dips in the sewer pipes where they crossed the water pipes. The plan was pronounced unsatisfactory and Judge Bell was instructed to appear before the state health commission to present the interests of the village, as the approval of the state board would compel the village to pay \$950 for the plan.

The village attorney was instructed to take the necessary steps to secure the erection of a bridge over the Lehigh Valley tracks at East Waverly. The estimated cost is \$12,000 of which the state, village and railroad stand one third each.

The board voted to pay \$75 toward the erection of a dyke along the Cayuta creek to prevent inundations. Nelson Lyons agreed to build the dyke for \$200, and guarantee that it would keep the creek from overflowing for all time. The railroad pays the same amount as the village, and private individuals pay the balance.

The report of the Chief of Police and Police Justice showed \$17.25 fines paid.

A number of bills were ordered paid and the board adjourned.

Waverly—The All Waverly football team will play the Owego team next Tuesday afternoon on the Howard street grounds. Waverly has won seven games and has not been scored on this season. Owego has a strong team, and a hard contest is expected.

COLUMBIA WAS OUTCLASSED.

Yale's Defense Line Proved Impregnable.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Yale surprised her most enthusiastic partisans by rolling up the phenomenal score of 52 to 0 against the Columbia college team which had the misfortune to be opposed to the New Haven aggregation. Probably 10,000 spectators went up to American League park to see the game.

Probably no Columbia eleven was ever more completely outplayed than the one which faced Yale. From whistle to whistle there was never the ghost of a chance that Columbia would score. She did not once get nearer than forty yards to the goal of the blue, and she was utterly helpless to make any impression upon the defense which the Yale line offered to her feeble attack.

It was seldom that the Morningside athletes had a chance to attack the Yale defense. Nineteen out of every twenty minutes they were being torn up and rolled over and pushed aside while the Yale rushers and backs carried the pigskin across their goal for a total of no less than nine touchdowns—yes, that was the number—from which Vessler, Hutchinson and Wiley kicked eight goals.

Pennsylvania Got a Jar.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 6.—Pennsylvania's overconfident football team got a jar from Lafayette here, when the latter institution scored on them, and but for the blocking of a kick would have gone off the field victors. As it was the game resulted in a 6 to 6 tie.

Indiana Scored Harvard.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 6.—A crushing offense enabled Harvard to make four touchdowns against the Carle Indians on Soldiers' field, but the crimson defense could not keep back the warrior opponents from scoring twice. The final score was 23 to 11.

Trimmed the Tigers.

PRINCETON, N. J., Nov. 6.—Princeton went down to defeat before the heavy Dartmouth team here by a score of 6 to 0. The visitors outweighed and outplayed the Princeton team.

Birmingham Victim Buried.

PAWTUCKET, R. I., Nov. 6.—The Roman Catholic church of Our Lady of the Consolation was filled to overflowing upon the occasion of the funeral of Midshipman Joseph L. Gauthier, one of the victims of the boiler explosion on the United States gunboat Bennington at San Diego, Cal. The services were conducted by Rev. Father J. C. Bessette. The body was escorted to Notre Dame cemetery, where the interment took place, by Company G of the Rhode Island militia.

After Senator Smoot's Sculp.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—Senator Burrows of Michigan, the chairman of the committee on privileges and elections, who has arrived in Washington for the coming session of congress, said last night that he expected to have the case of Senator Reed Smoot of Utah disposed of before the term ends. Senator Smoot's seat is being contested on the ground that he is a member of the Mormon hierarchy.

Taft Feted at Panama.

PANAMA, Nov. 6.—The celebrations here took the form of a grand reception given by president Amador in honor of Secretary Taft. All the prominent residents of Panama, together with the zone officials and members of the diplomatic and consular corps, were present. Secretary Taft leaves today for Colon, where the American colony will give a ball in his honor.

Welcomed With "Marseillaise."

PARIS, Nov. 6.—When Paul Deroulede, the founder of the League of Patriots, arrived in Paris, after an exile of six years, he was met at the station by a large crowd, which gave him an enthusiastic welcome and escorted him through the city, singing the "Marseillaise." It is expected that M. Deroulede will be re-elected to the chamber of deputies.

Binghamton Factory Burned.

BINGHAMTON, N. Y., Nov. 6.—Fire in the factory of the 1900 Washer company in this city caused damage estimated at \$15,000. The fire is believed to have been of incendiary origin.

El Paso Opera House Burned.

EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 6.—The Myzar Opera House was destroyed by fire here. Besides the playhouse and a hotel, a number of stores were in the building. The loss is \$100,000.
