**TROLLEY PASSENGERS  
WERE SHAKEN UP**

Rear-End Collision Near Power House Saturday Night Give Opera House Patrons a Bad Fright—No One Injured.

Loomis opera house patrons who were returning from Waverly Saturday evening on board cars No. 16 and 17 were given a lively shaking up just north of the power house, and although the women on the cars screamed and several turned white, fortunately no one was injured. Cars No. 16 and 17 are the large ones and they left Waverly together. Car 16 was ahead and soon after leaving Fulton street the trolley jumped from the wire. When the turn was reached north of the power house the trolley jumped off a second time and the lights went out leaving the car in total darkness. In the meantime car 17 was coming along behind and as the lights in the head car had been extinguished the motorman supposed that he had a clear track. When he rounded the curve, however, he discovered that the car ahead was directly in front, standing still. He applied the brakes and turned off the power, which decreased the speed of his car to some extent, but despite his exertions the car plunged into the rear end of the one ahead with a force that nearly threw the passengers from their seats. The passengers on the rear of the head car saw the danger and jumped. Aside from a good shaking up no one was injured. The coupling bars on the two cars were somewhat disarranged but no material damage was done. The remainder of the trip was without incident.

Pneumonia was the cause of death and he had been ill only one week. Short funeral services were held from the house yesterday at noon, after which the remains of the deceased were shipped to his former home at Ely Creek, N. Y. He is survived by his mother and two brothers. Undertaker R. S. Loomis had charge of the arrangements.

**WHERE ARE THIS  
MAN'S RELATIVES?**

Charles R. Beckman, a Barber, Died at the Hospital Last Night, and the Authorities Are Unable to Locate His Kinsmen

Charles K. Beckman, a barber by trade, who came to Sayre early last summer, and has since worked in various shops about town, died at the hospital last night about 5 o'clock of pernicious anemia. But little is known of the history of the deceased. He came here from Binghamton and went to work for Henry Honold on Lockhart street. Later he worked for Dan O'Brien, but a few weeks ago was taken ill at his room in the Sayre house where he remained until Thursday of last week when he was removed to the hospital. While here Beckman was rather reticent concerning his personal history. He said, however, that he had relatives at Olean and a small farm near that place. The statement concerning the farm was not believed by those who knew Beckman, as he acted queerly at times and was thought to have been suffering from the effects of drugs. After his admission to the hospital the authorities at that institution made an effort to locate his relatives but were unsuccessful.

The remains were removed to J. W. Grumme's undertaking rooms where they will be held until his relatives, if he has any, can be heard from. This morning his personal effects, which consisted of a barber's outfit, a suit of clothes, hats, caps, etc., were searched but nothing was found that would even give an inkling as to where his relatives might be located.

Beckman was a man about 45 years old, had thin, sallow complexion, and wore no beard. He was a member of the Binghamton branch of the barber's union, and had recently received a letter urging him to be more prompt in sending his dues to the secretary. Other letters were found in the pockets of his clothing which went to show that he had been making an effort to secure a situation.

**YARD BRAKEMAN  
BADLY INJURED**

Thrown Headfirst from a Freight Car Into a Carload of Pig Iron

Despite the fact that Robert Weeks, a yard brakeman, was thrown headlong from the top of a freight car into a coal car loaded with pig iron he lives to tell the tale, although at the present time he is lying on a cot at the hospital suffering from severe contusions of the head. Weeks was on top of a box car Saturday night giving signals when without warning a shift of cars going at a rapid rate struck the car upon which he was standing. The impact threw him headfirst into a car of pig iron. He fell several feet and when picked up was bleeding profusely from wounds in his head. The surgeons at the hospital do not apprehend serious consequences.

**REAR-END COLLISION  
NEAR MEHOOPANY**

Two Engines Badly Damaged, Fireman Injured—Engineer's Miraculous Escape

Three engines in a rear-end collision on the Lehigh Valley near Mehoopany Saturday night resulted in the cab and tender of one of the engines being badly smashed while the headlight and pilot on another were twisted and broken, the engineman on the first engine escaped without injury, in a manner unaccountable, while the fireman was brought to the hospital at Sayre suffering from three broken ribs and numerous bruises. The accident occurred about eleven o'clock. Three engines, Nos. 2593, 1034 and 2235 were being taken from the Sayre shops to Easton. The first two engines were coupled together, while the third one was running some distance in the rear. The enginemen on the forward engines, when near Mehoopany found the signals against them and stopped. The engineman on the rear engine decided to "creep" along slowly despite the fact that the signals were displayed, with the result that before he could stop, the pilot of his engine plunged into the tender of the engine ahead of him.

The tender was thrown upon the cab of the forward engine and then rolled over on to the westbound tracks completely blocking them. How the engineman escaped is more than can be told but he was found unhurt. The fireman, however, was injured as above stated. Traffic was delayed for some time and the wreck will be an expensive one for the company.

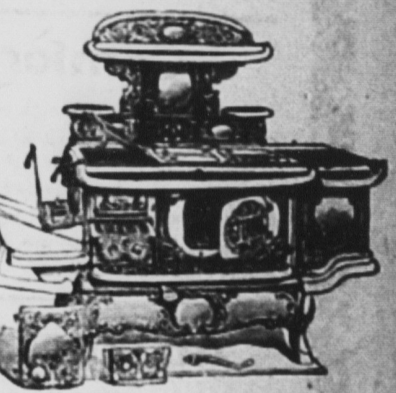
